County Girl Wins High WAC Rating

FORT DES MOINES, Iowa.—Sgt. Thelma D. Oltouse who holds the highest position on the post open to non-commissioned officers as sergeant major of first WAC training center, Fort Des Moines, Iowa, has been promoted to the highest non-commissioned grade, that of master sergeant. She is the daughter of Charles E. Davis, Cornelius.

Sergeant Oltouse joined the Women's Army corps as Thelma Davis August 26, 1942 and was married in November of 1943 to Sgt. (T-4) Roger M. Oltouse, who was then stationed at Fort Des Moines. He is now serving in the African theatre of operations.

Assigned here immediately upon completing basic training, Sgt. Oltouse has made steady progress toward her present rating. Since being promoted to staff sergeant (T-3) in February, 1943, and to technical sergeant in October, 1943.

Sgt. Oltouse was among the first on the post to receive a Good Conduct Medal for "exemplary behavior, efficiency, and fidelity" over a period of one year or more. In addition to the red and white ribbon designating this medal, she wears the green and gold ribbon for service in the corps before it became an integral part of the army.

In May of this year, Sgt. Oltouse visited in Portland during a delay en route after having been in charge of a convoy of 75 WACS being sent from Fort Des Moines to San Francisco for assignment in the field.

Sgt. Oltouse graduated from Hillsboro high school with the class of 1934, attended the Baker-Walker Business college in Portland, and prior to joining the Women's Army corps was manager of the Benson Hotel Tailor Shop in Portland.

HERE'S HOW TO MAKE MARVELOUS PEAR JAM
Save Sugar and Fruit with This Quick, Easy Recipe

3/4 Cup Ground Peas
4 1/2 Cups Sugar
1/4 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel, and core 2 1/2 pounds fully ripe pears; grind fruit. Measure exactly 3/4 level cups of the ground pears (add water to fill last cup, if necessary) into a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let the boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/4-inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
