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The two county clubs have been awarding helters in these contests for the past eight years.
Flower show, sponsored by county garden clubs, will be open to the public, according to Thomas. In past years the impression has been widespread that competition was open only to members of county garden clubs, he said, but anyone may enter exhibits in the various events. Judges for the show are Dean Collins of Portland, Prof. A. G. B. Bouquet of Corvallis and Mrs. Robert P. Denney of Beaverton.
The "Mutt Dog Show," popular fair feature for many years, will again be sponsored by the Hillsboro Rotary club with John R. Cox as committee chairman. The event

is set for 1:15 p. m. Saturday, September 2, and there will be prizes for dogs of all shapes, sizes, colors and descriptions.
Members of the Washington County Jersey Cattle club will hold a pot-luck dinner at the park Saturday noon, according to Fred Knox, president. All Jersey breeders, 4-H and FFA members are invited to attend. All are asked to bring well-filled baskets.
Several innovations in 4-H dairy events were announced this week by Don Anderson, assistant county agent. The 4-H Jersey and Guernsey breed yearling classes will be divided into junior and senior yearling animals. If five or more two-year-old Jersey or Guernsey animals are exhibited, these will be placed in a separate class from aged cows. Showmanship contests will be divided into junior and senior classes. If 10 or more entrants are listed in any breed, first and second year club members will be grouped in the junior class.

Special Rail Rates Planned for Vets

Oregon personnel now being discharged from the United States army, navy, marines or coast guard will be able to reach their homes with more of their discharge pay in their pockets. Because of an order authorized today by Public Utilities Commissioner George H. Flagg, Flagg approved a plan that will allow discharged personnel to travel at half fare on all railroads. The rate takes effect September 1, with the usual privilege of completing the journey in 30 days.

Peach Canning Tips Explained By Food Aide

Amount of peaches canned need not depend on the sugar in the cupboard; peaches may be canned satisfactorily with little or no sugar. Choose fresh, firm, ripe fruit. The background color is more important than the pink blush found on many varieties of peaches. If the background is green, the peach is not ripe for canning and when it does ripen will likely have a poor flavor. Choose peaches with yellow or whitish-yellow background.

Wash and peel peaches. For easy peeling, place in a wire basket or cheesecloth, dip into boiling water for a minute or so, then dip quickly in cold water and skin. Handle only one canner load at a time. To prevent peaches from spotting dip them into a solution of one level tablespoon of salt, 1 1/2 tablespoons white vinegar to 3 quarts of cold water. Rinse in cold water before canning.

If peaches are not juicy, extra juice may be needed in pre-cooking and packing the fruit. For this set aside sound peaches too soft for canning, crush and heat to boiling, then strain. When canning without sugar cook fruit in its own juice until heated throughout, but not soft. If fruit is not juicy add just enough water to keep it from sticking to pan.
When canning with sugar, pack in one of 2 ways: For juicy fruit add 1/2 cup sugar to each quart of peaches. Cover with boiling liquid, still leaving 1/2 inch at top. If usually tame peaches and heat to boiling, for less juicy fruit make a sugar syrup, add peaches and heat fruit throughout, but don't cook until soft.

Pack hot peaches into jars, leaving 1/2 inch headspace. Cover with boiling liquid, still leaving 1/2 inch at top. If usually tame peaches and heat to boiling, for less juicy fruit make a sugar syrup, add peaches and heat fruit throughout, but don't cook until soft.

and if necessary add more liquid. Wipe jar rim with a clean, damp cloth. One sticky bit can keep jar from sealing airtight. Put on jar top and adjust according to kind. Process in boiling water bath for 20 minutes. If the peaches have been simmered from 4 to 8 minutes, 15 minutes processing time is required. If peaches are packed raw, 25 to 35 minutes of processing is required.
When processing time is up, finish sealing of jar if type of lid requires further sealing. Set jars to cool, right side up, and away from drafts.

"Christmas gifts mean much to our people overseas. Because of strong tying, heavy paper and boxes and fiberboard will prove of real help in making delivery of gifts possible I urge those at home to begin saving these materials now. As time goes on they are going to become even more scarce than they are now."

Among the more important rules for Christmas mailings to the armed forces overseas are the following:
The parcel must not exceed five pounds, and must not be more than 15 inches in length or 36 inches in length and girth combined. It should be marked "Christmas parcel" so that it may be given special attention to assure its arrival before December 25.
Not more than one parcel may be mailed in any one week to the same member of the armed forces by or in behalf of the same mailer.
When combination packages are made up of such items as miscellaneous toilet articles, hard candies, soaps, etc., the contents should be tightly packed so that they will not become loosened in transit and damage the contents or the cover.
Hard candies, nuts, caramels (including those covered with chocolate), cookies, fruit cake, and chocolate bars individually wrapped in waxed paper should be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal, or cardboard.

Perishable goods, such as fruits and vegetables that may spoil, are prohibited. Intoxicants, inflammable materials such as matches

Full Car Clubs To Be Required On Gas Rations

A rigid program, effective at once, requiring all home-to-work automobile drivers to carry "full car clubs" to qualify for supplemental gasoline, was announced today by Harold Meyer, chairman of the local war price and rationing board. The plan is part of a nation-wide program to save gasoline and tires by stepping up the efficiency of car-pooling, he explained.

Under the new program local OPA boards have been instructed to issue only enough gasoline for 30 days to drivers who do not have full ride-sharing arrangements, Meyer emphasized.

During the 30-day period, all applicants who lack sufficient riders will be expected to recruit their car clubs to full strength. Then they may re-submit their application to the board, showing signatures of three or more riders, and the board will issue supplemental ration for the normal three-month period.

If alternative means of transportation exist, local boards, under the new program, "will be expected to refuse supplemental ration to drivers who do not meet the car-sharing requirement." OPA is also seeking to encourage the rotation of cars by members of car clubs. "By riding together, members of a car pool can use each car only one day out of four or five," Meyer pointed out. "Thus, each driver can help reduce total gasoline consumption of the pool as much as 80 per cent, increase the operating life of each car five-fold, and materially prolong the life of his tires."

Drivers can also satisfy the ride-sharing requirement by forming a club of neighbors who do not have cars. Each applicant must submit the signatures of his riders with his application, and the ride-sharing arrangement must be a definite agreement regularly carried out, Meyer emphasized.

or lighter fluids, poisons, and anything that may damage other mail are also prohibited. Gifts enclosed in glass should be substantially packed to avoid breakage. Sharp instruments, such as razors, and knives, must have their edges and points protected so that they cannot cut through the coverings and injure postal personnel or damage other packages.

Relatives and friends who know that the personnel in the armed services to whom they plan to send gifts are at far distant points should begin to mail their packages on the opening day—September 15—of the mailing period. Last year late mailings, causing concentration of great numbers of packages in the final days of the mailing period, threatened to defeat the program. It is stressed that success can be assured, with the limited personnel and facilities available, only if the public gives full cooperation through prompt mailings of the overseas gift parcels from the opening of the mail period.
