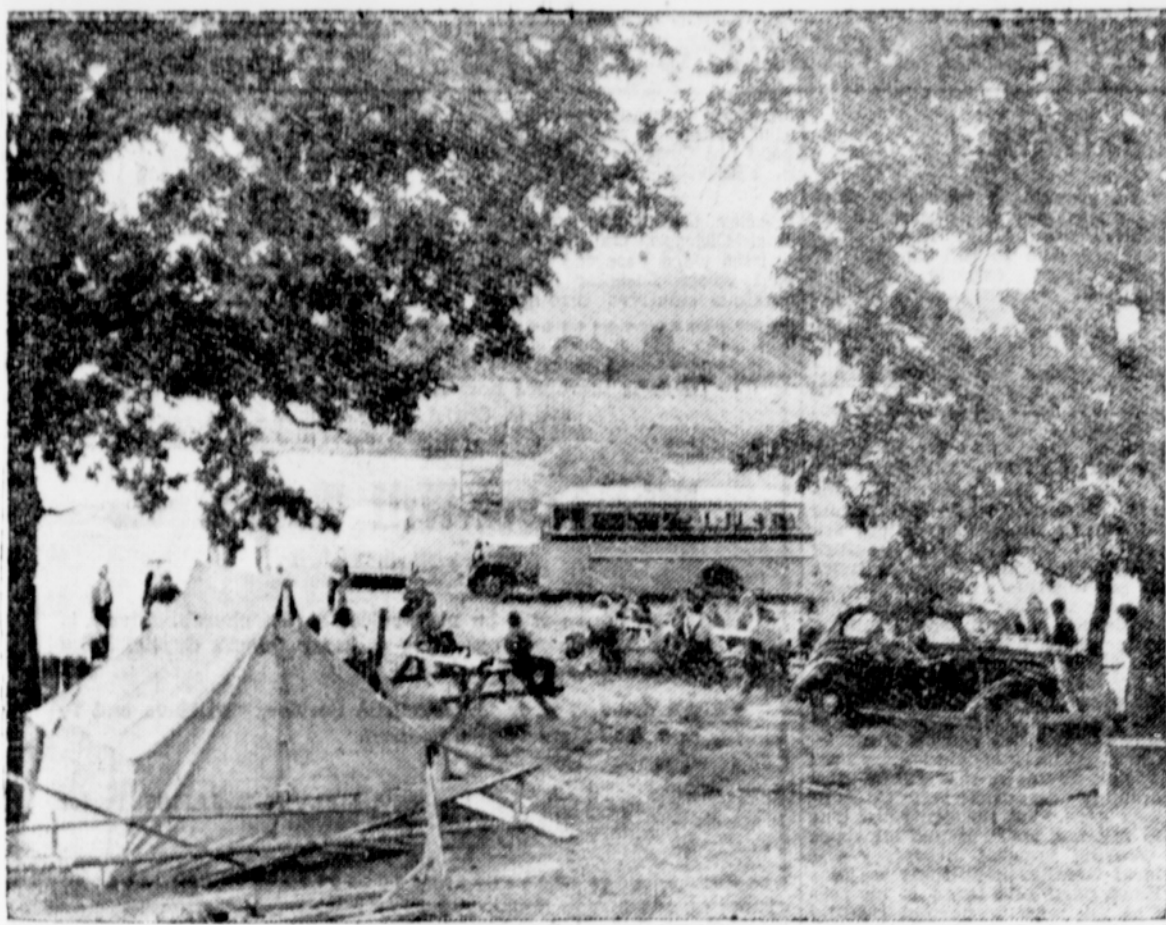

**Speaker Tells of China.** Missionary meeting at the grange hall last Thursday night was well attended. The speaker, Mrs. Beatrice VanMeter, a returned missionary from China, entertained her audience with graphic descriptions and slide pictures of her work in the Orient. She told of personal travels on the Burma road, which she says is a very steep and rugged pass, where an average of 1000 lives are lost each week by accidents. One such she

witnessed. A car overturned and the natives in their fear of the sight of death refused to investigate the possibility of finding someone still alive under the wreckage, so she went alone, but found all of the passengers dead.

In the interior of China where Chinese girl babies are considered worthless, she visited an orphanage where some of them had been taken when rescued. Weak from exposure and neglect their chance of life was small, but she bought two of them for 45 cents each and hoped to raise them. Both died, however.

Mrs. VanMeter has three children, two girls and a boy. Her husband, who is now dead, was also a missionary in China and the youngest daughter was born there. Her lecture was delivered in Chinese costume. She is a sister of Mrs. Forrest Forbes.

Mrs. Mary Vanderwal, formerly of Hillsboro, died in Portland August 18. Funeral services were held in Portland Tuesday and commitment was in Rose City cemetery.

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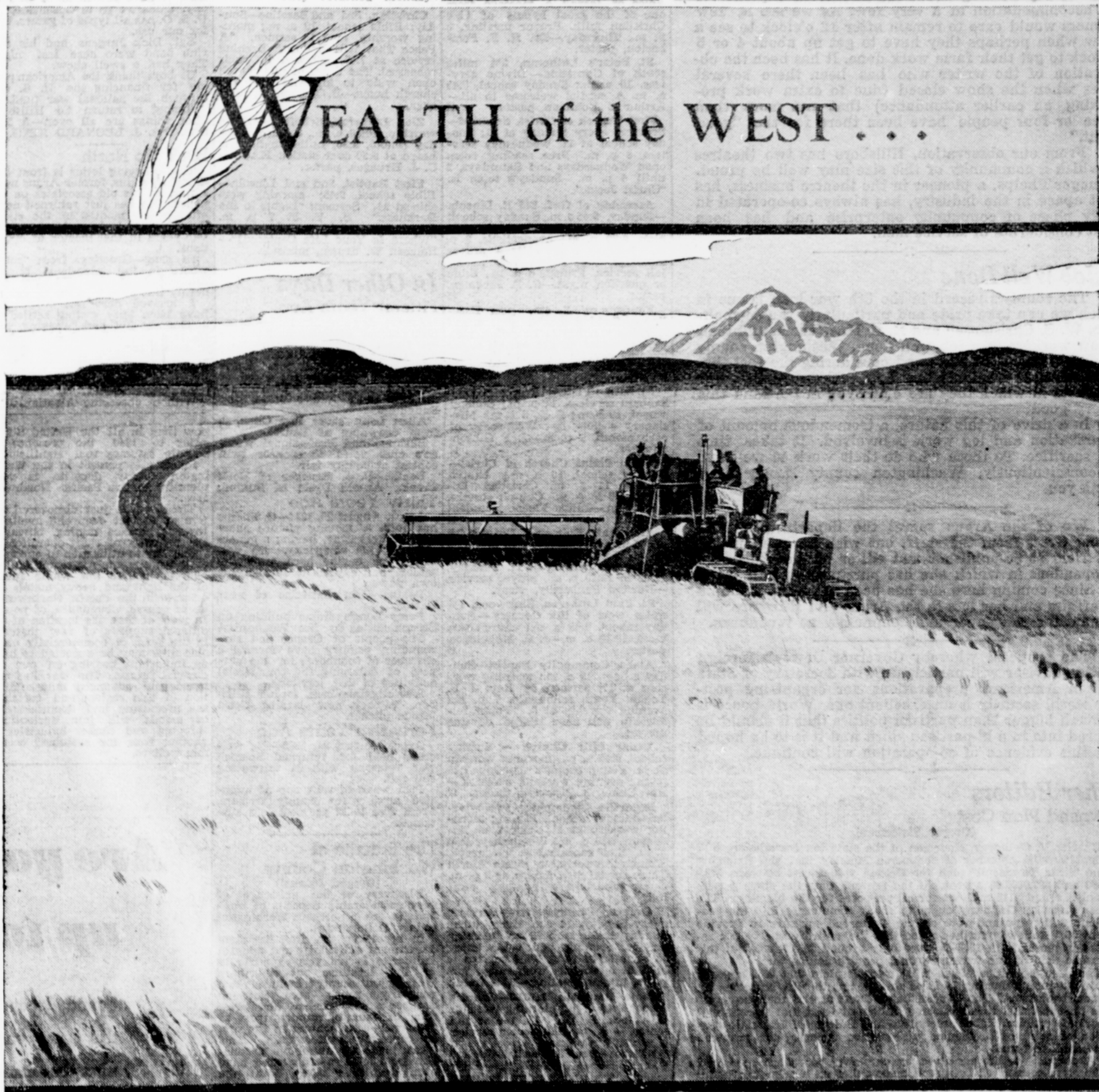
