Major Long volunteered May 21, 1943, was commissioned and given the oath within five days thereafter. C. national guard, next with 110th field artillery on the Mexican border, and third with the army of occupation in Germany in the disarmament service.

His present service is for the duration. Upon its completion he will resume his citizenship in Portland. He is a law graduate of Georgetown university, Washington, D. C.
