

Church Conference Opens at Pacific U

Congregational churches third annual northwest conference is under way at Pacific University with more than 100 registered delegates from northwest states and California attending opening sessions. Conference activities opened Monday evening with Rev. Paul A. Davies, superintendent of the Oregon conference, presiding at a well-attended dinner for the delegates. Following the dinner, Dr. Albert Rasmussen, director of research and survey of the Chicago Congregational union, speaking on "Our Moving Americans," stated that churches should assume the responsibility of helping people uprooted from their homes to adjust themselves in new communities. More than 30,000,000 Americans have changed their homes in the last three years, Dr. Rasmussen stated. Tuesday morning, Dr. Kenneth Scott Latourette of Yale university, told delegates that Christianity is more evenly spread and more deeply rooted among more different peoples than ever before and that Christians of the world are coming together with a wider range of influence over the world as a whole.

Rev. Harold Kingsley, national minister of Congregational work among Negroes, started out with "The American Dilemma." Evening sessions program with an address, program was devoted to "The Women of the Churches," by Mrs. E. E. McClintock, secretary of Women's work at Chicago.

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FRESH PEACH JAM IS EASY TO MAKE

Here's a Recipe That
Saves Sugar and Fruit

4 Cups Ground Peaches
6 Cups Sugar
1 Cup Lemon Juice
1 Package M.C.P. Pectin

Wash, peel, and remove pits from 4 pounds, fully ripe peaches; grind the fruit. Measure exactly 4 level cups of the ground peaches (add water to fill out last cup, if necessary) in a large kettle. Add the M.C.P. Pectin and lemon juice, stir well and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. NOW, add the sugar (which has been previously measured), continue stirring, and bring to a full rolling boil. BOIL EXACTLY 4 MINUTES. Remove from fire, let boil subside, stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes. Pour into sterilized jars, allowing 1/2 inch space for sealing with fresh paraffin.
