Services Held for Mrs. Emilie Paetsch

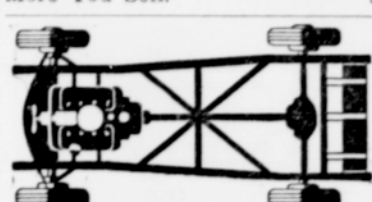

will start September 5, the day after Labor Day, according to Louis Hillecke, chairman of the board.

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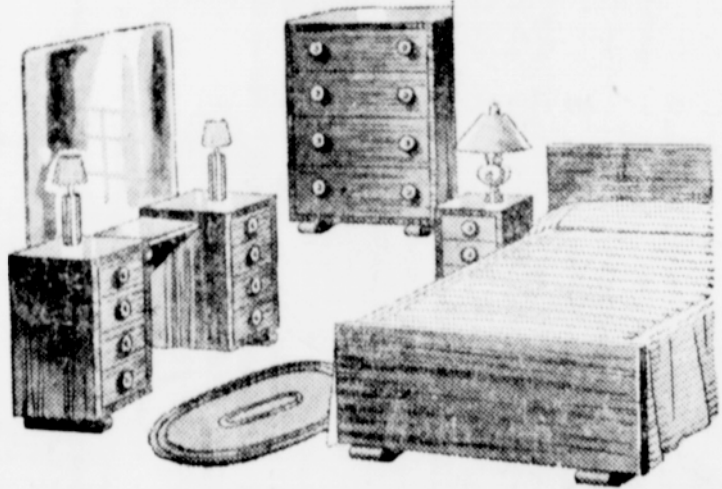
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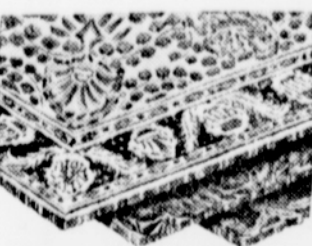
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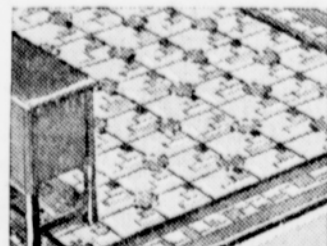
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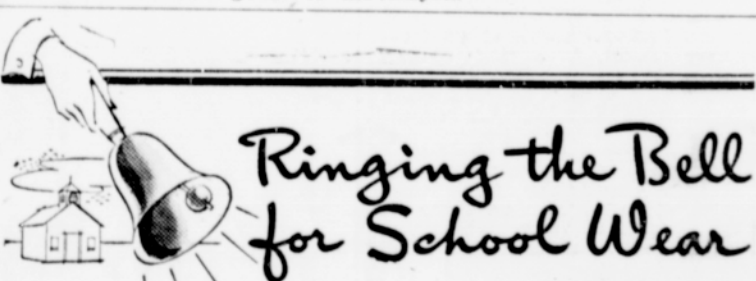
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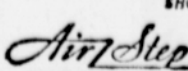
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
