

Second Vote on Beaverlton Union High Necessary

Failure to post election notices within the required time in Beaverlton district No. 83 has made it necessary to hold another election for the formation of the Beaverlton union high school district. The district boundary board has set the election for Tuesday, September 19, at 8 p. m. in the school houses of the districts involved.

The formation of the district was approved August 8 in a majority of the 15 districts included by a total vote of 189 to 75. However, the technicality voided this election and it is necessary to call a second election. To form the district a majority of the districts must approve and there must be an overall majority vote in favor. Beaverlton voted favorably on the district at an earlier date 89 to 6.

Districts outside of Beaverlton included in the proposed union high school district are: Bonyon, Sipe, Tualatin View, Raleigh, Union, Sylvan, Hiteon, McKay, Kinton, McKinley, Hazeldale, Barnes, Cedar Mill, Cooper, Mountain, Alena-Huber and Bethany.

Mr. John Allan Paterson, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Paterson of Hillsboro, has received an appointment to West Point military academy from Senator Guy Gordon.

Paterson is at present stationed with an anti-aircraft unit of the 29th Infantry at Camp Breckinridge, Kentucky. An honor graduate of Lincoln high school in Portland in June 1942, where he won letters in football and track, Paterson entered Stanford university in September, 1942, where he enlisted in the Enlisted Reserve Corps. In April 1943, he was assigned to the field artillery at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, for his basic training and in August, 1943, was transferred to the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn, N. Y., as an ASTP student in engineering.

Later he was assigned to the 75th division at Shreveport, Louisiana, for maneuvers and from there was given his present assignment, where he took the competitive examination for West Point. Young Paterson has been active in Boy Scouts and was an assistant scoutmaster prior to entering Stanford. He is a member of Phi Kappa Psi.
