

Many Items of Food Cut Off from Rationing List in a Surprise Move

Largest single cut in rationing—making 17 separate items point free effective September 17—was announced from Washington on Wednesday. The reduction includes many canned vegetables, baby foods, soups and fruit spreads.

The surprise move left ketchup, canned tomatoes and fruits, tomato juice, pineapple juice and grape juice as the principal processed foods still requiring blue stamps. The action did not affect rationed meats, butter, cheese and other foods taking red points.

Points Lifted; Some Cheeses Boost Value

Dry beans, prune juice and fruit butters were left at the same point values for September, according to OPA announcement last week.

Making public the ration values decided on for the September 3-30 period OPA left present point costs for rationed meats unchanged but boosted some cheeses two points a pound.

Beef roasts and steaks of grades AA, A and B, lamb chops and roasts of the same grades, and pork hams and loins will continue to cost the same number of points as in August. All other meats will remain point free, including all cuts of grade C beef and lamb.

Processed food items carrying a zero point value on the September chart:

Grapefruit juice, orange-grapefruit juice, green or waxed beans, beets, carrots, spinach, greens, grape jam, preserves or marmalade, tomato jam, citrus marmalades, fruit butters and dry beans.

Group 3 cheeses, such as Swiss, Italian, Munster, Limburger, Camembert, Liederkranz, grated dehydrated, brick, Gouda, Creek, Edam, Bleu and Brie will be increased from 8 to 10 points, canned milk will cost one point a pound instead of two-thirds point.

Creamery butter will continue to cost 16 points a pound, but process butter is increased from 6 to 12 points.

The only sharp increase in point value of processed food is in pineapple juice, which advances 15 to 25 points for a No. 2 (18 ounce) can.

Ration points will continue on all varieties of canned dry beans, the zero value applying only to raw dry beans, regardless of variety or color. The zero point value on fruit butters applies to apple, grape and peach butters.

Tomato Juice Juggled

The point value of small containers of tomato juice (14 ounces) is adjusted upward, and the point value of small containers of tomato pulp or puree is adjusted downward.

The point value of mixed vegetables (succotash, carrots and peas and other mixed vegetables containing more than 20 per cent by weight of rationed vegetables) is reduced from 10 to 5 points.

Cluster Added To Air Medal

EIGHTH AIR FORCE BOMBER STATION, England—Staff Sgt. Arnold F. McRobert, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. George C. McRobert of Gale Creek, received a cluster to his air medal. McRobert is a waist gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress and was awarded the oakleaf cluster in lieu of another air medal.

He was decorated for "meritorious achievement" during bombing attacks on Nazi war plants and on military targets in France in support of Allied ground forces, the report stated. His group is a unit of the 3rd Bombardment Division, cited by the President for its shuttle mission to Africa when Messerschmitt aircraft plants at Regensburg were bombed.

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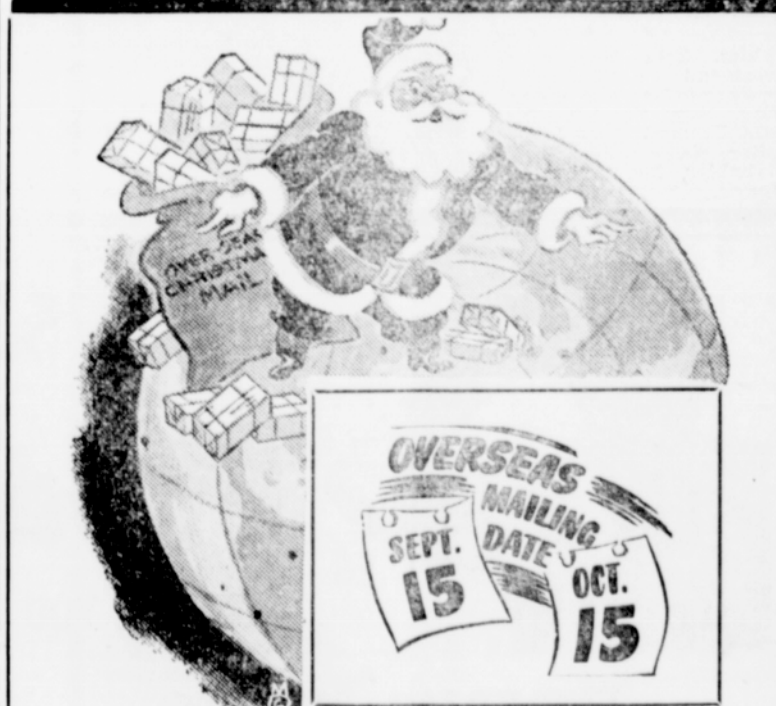
