Mr. Killgore was born in Adair County, Mo., September 14, 1849. He grew to manhood in Missouri and was married to Mary Jane Line in 1869. In 1875 Mr. and Mrs. Killgore and their three children and Mrs. Killgore's father and mother came to Oregon, first settling near Mountaineer. About 15 months later they moved to Weston, where he purchased a large tract of land, which he still owns. Mr. Killgore's parents passed away at Weston and in 1906 he returned to Cornelius with his wife and the youngest of their seven children, making his home ever since.

Mrs. Killgore died in 1939 and for several years Marian Towery and family and later Jess Towery and family made their home with Mr. Killgore. In 1936 Jess Towery moved to Weston to take charge of Mr. Killgore's ranch and the same year in September Mr. Killgore married Mrs. Nellie Myers of Forest Grove.

Four of the seven children are still living. They are Mrs. Ivy Ritchie of Forest Grove, Will Killgore of Weston, Idaho, J. H. Killgore of Los Angeles and J. H. Killgore of Cornelius. There are 14 living grandchildren, 14 great grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

During his long residence here Mr. Killgore has made many friends and enjoyed exceptionally good health. He has been a member of the Masonic lodge over 30 years and a member of the I. O. O. F. lodge of Weston for 45 years.

Mr. Killgore at one time served as mayor of Cornelius.
