Right now—before Johnny comes marching home again and before the Victory parade sweeps down Main street—is the time to make your own post-war plans. The Office of Economic Stabilization urges. Planned spending and saving will make possible post-war purchases of such things as homes, household equipment and automobiles. It will permit children to be given better educational opportunities, and make it possible for returning veterans and others to start new businesses. Comprehensive budgeting was recommended by OES as the heart of planned saving and spending.

OES said that funds can be set aside advantageously in these days of merchandise scarcities for many types of goods that will almost certainly be better and more available in price after the war than they are now possible to buy. Only by working out a budget for a family or a business can expenditures in relation to income—a necessary preliminary where it is desirable and feasible to effect economies or a budget on paper encourage precise estimates, according to OES, because it facilitates the review and follow-up that are essential to the success of planned money management.

One method recommended for cooking fish in hot weather is to cut the fish into serving portions, salt lightly on both sides, and let stand for about 10 minutes to absorb the salt. Then dip the pieces in liquid (beaten egg, milk or water) and coat with some dry cereal. Place in heavy frying pan containing about one-fourth inch of fat, hot but not smoking. Cover and cook at moderate heat, turning it when browned. Pickle and slices of wedges of lemon will help dress up the platter.

Onion tops, neck included, can be used instead of dried onions in making onion soup, according to tests of the Massachusetts experiment station. This part of the onion has more nutritive value, especially calcium, and it constitutes as much as 50 per cent of the weight of the vegetable.

How to Send Fruit Cakes, Candy Overseas

Fruit cakes sent overseas in 1 1/2 cans should be baked and then allowed to cool in the tin before being removed. Wash the can and line side and bottom with two layers of wax paper before replacing cake in the can. Homemade candy may be poured directly into the tin before it has cooled. Good suggestions for filling cans are moist cake, fruit of many kinds, candies, nuts and dried fruits. Fudge cakes may be frozen in the cans.
