

Home Service Representative Visits Red Cross

Miss Estelle Jamieson, field representative of the home service department of the Red Cross from the Pacific area office in San Francisco, was guest speaker at the Red Cross meeting Thursday night at headquarters. Miss Jamieson, who was here last week with her mother, Mrs. Marion Gorman, executive secretary, and other Red Cross workers, gave a list of the varied duties of home service chairmen. She stated that the work of the home service chairmen would continue for years, and that the peak of home service in World War I did not come until 1918.

The local home service chairmen's report showed that 73 home service cases had been handled during the month of August. These cases included inquiries, messages to and from relatives and friends in foreign countries, Furlough and farlough extension verification. Reports on health of families. Other reports requested by field director. Assistance with government benefits. Consultation and guidance. Referrals to other agencies. Financial assistance. Activities of prisoners of war.

Ex-service men and dependents—Assistance, claims for disability pension; for death pensions; assistance with insurance claims. Hospitalization and domiciliary care. Vocational rehabilitation. Information only. Reports to Veterans' administration.

Civilians and others—Inquiries and messages. Information only. Reporting service. Financial assistance, etc.

Monthly reports of chairmen were given as follows: Mrs. R. W. Weil, motor corps chairman, reported trip to Forest Grove, 12 miles, two trips to Turner, 160 miles each, August 6 and August 13, time 9 1/2 hours; blood bank set up, two girls, two hours; blood bank set up, four girls, 18 hours.

Mrs. L. R. Wikie, chairman, surgical dressings—52 workers, 238 hours, 222 dressings.

Corinne Pennington, chairman, home nursing nurses aides and nurse recruitment—Class in process of organization. Blood bank. Six nurses, 24 hours, two nurses aides, eight hours, five lay helpers, 20 hours.

Mrs. Gene G. Carver, chairman, sewing production—300 housewives filled, 15 complete layettes, work started on 238 apron-type kit bags. Ladies have worked on war release material all summer.

Mrs. R. G. Gull, chairman, knitting—White yarn has been received for toe sock, thigh and ankle stump sock and heel sock. Twenty ladies put in 165 hours work during the summer.

Mrs. J. Kovaly, chairman, canteen—Nine volunteer workers served 225 people, worked 49 1/2 hours.

Mrs. F. Abendorth, chairman, blood plasma—160 pints blood donated, 31 new donors, 34 silver pins given. Four eight-time donors. Chapter now has eight "Gallon Club" members. Time 117 hours on Blood Unit Day, exclusive of canteen and plasma chairmen. Chairman's total hours service 57. Out-of-town donors Poulso, Wash, Myrtle Point, Vernonia and Portland.
