After two years of service in the South Pacific area, Andrew Young, PM 2/c, arrived last week on a 30-day furlough and is visiting his parents, Dr. and Mrs. Henry Young.

Young's first year was spent in New Zealand, and he has served in the Gilberts, Saipan, Tinian, Tarawa and other places. At Saipan, he was in action 22 days, with 70 per cent casualties in his division, the first battalion of 29th Marines. At Tarawa it was also very bad, the medical detachment being under constant shell fire while taking care of the wounds of their comrades.

He has a presidential citation and two campaign stars. He is also eligible for the purple heart.

It is good to get back to the states, and there was great rejoicing among the service men when they sighted Golden Gate at 3 p. m. on September 19," said Young.
