Logan Attends National Meet

Kenneth Logan, a member of the Hillsboro chapter of Future Farmers of America, will leave today as one of the Oregon FFA representatives at the national convention to be held October 8 to 11 in Kansas City. Kenneth is state treasurer of the FFA.

Other delegates are: State President Reed Vollstedt, Albany; Delmar Elbert, Milwaukie; state vice-president, Donald Tykemon, Newberg; state secretary, Delbert Frost, Enterprise; state reporter, and Fred Bernier, Scappoose; candidate for American Farmer degree, they will be accompanied by Ralph L. Morgan, state department of vocational agricultural education, and John Welbes, Albany adviser.

They hope to bring more honors to Oregon. Because of wartime conditions, only 700 boys will attend the convention instead of about 2000 that formerly were at it.

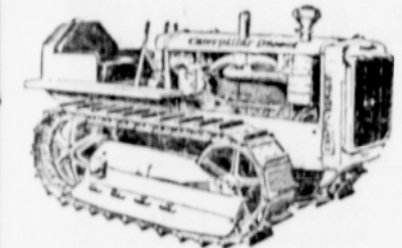

The removal of rationing restrictions from all farm machinery except corn pickers, announced from Washington recently, does not change the status of crawler-type tractors, which are handled under a different distribution system, according to officials of the state AAA office at Corvallis. Fire Prevention Week Observance October 8 to 14

Fire Prevention week, to be held this year, October 8 to 14, offers to 4-H club members an excellent opportunity to marshal their youthful energies behind the slogan: "Feed Firefighters, Not Fires," according to Don Anderson, assistant county agent.

Fire prevention has long been a year-around project of 4-H clubs, but this year it is more important than ever to a concerted effort to combat the causes of farm fires during Fire Prevention week. With so many thousands of men from rural areas in the armed forces, volunteer fire departments are depleted of manpower. Farmers also are working overtime to produce record-breaking quantities of food, and the burned buildings take with them, hard-to-replace materials and machines. So the boys and girls in the 4-H clubs can make a major contribution to the war effort by organizing local fire prevention campaigns.

Every year millions of dollars worth of food that might feed fighters, and other millions of dollars in buildings and farm equipment are lost in smoke. National Fire Protection association estimates that 85 per cent of the fires are caused by carelessness and can be prevented.

There are many worthwhile projects the 4-H clubs can sponsor. They can impress upon the community the importance of fire prevention by placing the countryside with Fire Prevention week slogans: "To Speed Victory, Prevent Fires," and "Feed Firefighters, Not Fires."

They can distribute leaflets telling the story of the dangers of fire hazards; they can help organize farm-by-farm inspection tours to root out the eight usual fire hazards; and they can enlist actively in the volunteer fire-fighting services.

The eight principal farm fire hazards to be eliminated include: defective flues and sooty chimneys which should be repaired and cleaned; flammable wooden shingles which should be replaced with fire-resistant roofing materials; defective heating plants; careless handling of gasoline and kerosene; carelessness with smoking and matches; inadequate lightning rod protection; spontaneous combustion of hay; and accumulated rubbish in the home and farm buildings. Paper and rags are badly needed for many war purposes and should be turned over to local salvage committees.

Despite all precautions and safeguards, some fires are bound to break out. When they do, a ladder should be enough to reach the highest roof, an approved fire extinguisher ready to operate the moment needed, pails of water and sand, and a hose and a broom for brush fires should be ready. 4-H club members can make sure that these "fire aid kits" are complete and ready to answer the call of "Fire."

Demonstrations Slated Friday

Two meetings demonstrating irrigated and dry land pastures will be held Friday, October 6, one at the David Hagz & Sons farm, one mile south of Hillsboro, and the other at the Ed Freudenthal farm, two miles southeast of Hillsboro, according to County Agent Palmer Torvond.

A dry land pasture for dairy cows has been established on the Hagz farm and here farmers will have an opportunity to see the difference between fall and spring seedings of grass and legumes for pasture purposes.

The other meeting will be held on an irrigated pasture at Freudenthal's which was planted 12 years ago, consisting of ladino clover, ryegrass and orchard grass. According to irrigation specialists at the college, this is one of the good irrigated pastures in the Willamette valley. Freudenthal has followed a definite fertilizer program which will be discussed at the meeting.

The meetings are scheduled for 10 a. m. at the Hagz farm and 1:30 p. m. at the Freudenthal farm.

War Mobilization Director Byrnes declares wage and price controls will continue while U. S. prosecutes war against Japan.

Friday, September 29
Seek to Trap Nazis
British 3rd army lashes out east, west and north in drives to pin perhaps 200,000 Germans against sea in western Holland and menaces German salient along 18-mile front. Large forces massing for drive.

Eldest Jap Shipping
American task force planes sink or damage up to 90 Japanese surface craft, including six warships and wipe out 36 planes in central Philippines seventh day of powerful American 12-aircraft invasion-menaced archipelago.

Fears War in 1945
Prime Minister Churchill says European war must last several months into 1945 and find desperate Nazis still fighting as guerrillas after official end.

Saturday, September 30
End Ties of Western Front
Allied armies press Germans back at opposite ends of the 480-mile western front. At last, in mountain strongholds near Belfort.

Take Three More Islands
U. S. islanders capture third unnamed island northeast of Peleliu Thursday, only six hours after re-occupying occupation of Ngese and Kongora islands. Last day of Palau operations mounted to 9772.

Sunday, October 1
Near Belfort
American 7th army drives to within nine miles of gateway city of Belfort to challenge Germans along chain of snow-covered peaks in Vosges mountains blocking southern route to Rhineland.

Reds in Yugoslavia
Russian troops invading Yugoslavia aim to seal off last German salient in lower Balkans.

Nelson Resigns
Donald M. Nelson resigns as WPB chairman and J. A. Krug is named to succeed him.

Monday, October 2
Nazis Counterattack
German border make sharp local attacks eastward while Germans throw in counterblows in effort to check growing allied pressure. Gen Eisenhower warns Austrians to prepare for invasion by allies.

Advance in Yugoslavia
Russian troops strike 23 miles deeper into Yugoslavia.

Yanks Lose Base
Japanese offensive in China has driven American air force from a fourth air base.

Secure Islands
U. S. forces secure strategic island of Peleliu and its three satellite islands with exception of a small group of fiercely resisting Japanese.

Tuesday, October 3
Smash Into Siegfried Line
U. S. 1st army, losing powerful drive under earth-shaking barrage of bombs and shells, smashes into Siegfried line on new front and furious battle rages as Germans fight from pillboxes barring way to Rhineland.

Forces Linked
Russians link up with Yugoslav forces in converging drive on Belgrade.

Plane Loss 42,000
General Arnold announces that army air forces have lost 42,000 airplanes since Pearl Harbor. 14,000 of them on combat missions overseas. More than 27,000 enemy have been destroyed with 6,000 probables and 10,000 damaged.

Filbert Picking Demonstrations Set

Two filbert picking demonstrations have been scheduled for Washington county on October 12, according to Palmer S. Torvond, county agent.

One demonstration will be held on the Henry Meltebecke farm five miles north of Hillsboro near the Jackson school at 10 a. m. The other will be at the L. R. Pearson farm, one mile north of Redville, on the road north of Aachen, at 1:30 p. m.

The picker will be demonstrated by the agricultural engineering department of Oregon State college in the vacuum type, Torvond reported. The machine has been used with reasonable success in the harvest of certain seed crops.

Anyone interested is invited to attend either of these meetings.
