Cpl. Waibel Aids In Bridge Repair

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, FORWARD PRESS CAMP—Demolished bridges and mine fields the Nazis have had time to plant are providing no obstacle to the rapid advance of the 45th division nearing the German border, largely through the work of the division's combat engineers.

Moving forward with the advance troops, often ahead of the infantry, these soldiers are clearing mines, building by-passes and temporary bridges and removing booby traps and road blocks with such speed that the infantry can move ahead without a pause.

So far, say these soldiers who have made landings in Sicily, at Salerno and Anzio, and in Southern France, the Nazis have had little time to plant mine fields or booby traps. A few Teller mines have been picked up in the roads, a few booby traps found in road blocks. And most of the road blocks have been simply felled trees that are pushed aside by bulldozers or pulled off the road with trucks.

The bridges and foot bridges that these men throw up where the enemy has smashed a bridge are only temporary structures, designed to move the division forward and to be replaced by permanent structures by corps of army engineers. But even so these are constructed in almost record time—six to eight hours.

Hardest task for this company is to keep up with the advance. Such a task as a permanent camp is unknown. Usually the men move at least once a day, sometimes as often as three times. Always their squares are ahead, tearing out road blocks or sweeping the way for the infantrymen.

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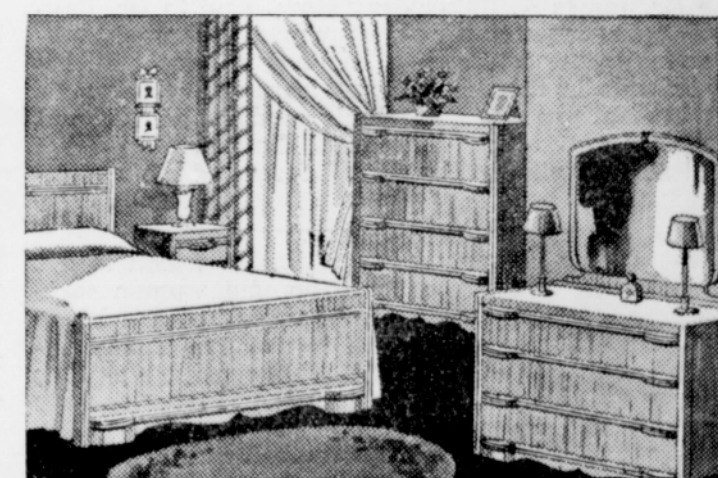


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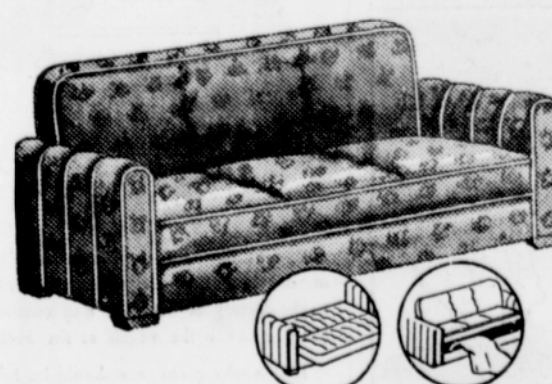
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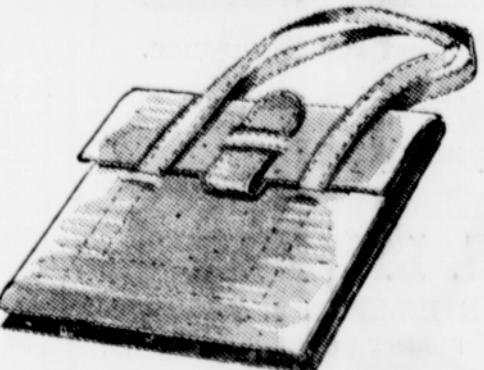
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
