Capt. Young Wins Oak Leaf Cluster

AIR TRANSPORT COMMAND BASE, India—Captain Robert Young of Hillsboro, has been awarded the Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal. It has been announced by Brigadier Gen. Thomas O. Hardin, commanding the India-China division of the air transport command.

Since his arrival in this overseas area Captain Young has been serving with the India-China division of the air transport command. This division is the AIC unit which, as the "India-China Wing," undertakes the creation and maintaining of America's "aerial pipeline of supply" across the Himalayan "hump" in northern India, for United Nations' battlefronts in China.

According to the citation accompanying his award Captain Young has to his credit, as a pilot with the AIC carriers over the Himalayas, more than 450 hours of operational flights over the difficult and dangerous Assam-China air routes, where enemy interception and attack was probable and expected.

Captain Young's citation is specifically for his period of duty between October 17, 1943, and January 9, 1944.

President Roosevelt and Governor Dewey Cite Importance of the Press

Statements relative to National Newspaper Week, which was observed throughout the nation last week, have been issued by President Roosevelt and Governor Dewey, republican presidential candidate. They stress the importance of a free press to the people and tell of the great part the press has played in the war effort.

The American press has met the test of our greatest national crisis with courage, loyalty and integrity, declared President Franklin D. Roosevelt in a National Newspaper Week statement to members of the Newspaper Association Managers. He says:

"The free press of America is a living symbol of democracy, and as such, it is in the forefront of democracy's battle for survival. It is helping to win that battle and will help to win the peace and a better and freer world in the future."

"The press of America has upheld the hand of the soldier at the front and the worker on the production line. By providing the people with honest news, it has enlightened the minds of the people and strengthened their will. It has loyally shared in the sacrifices imposed by the need to ration essential materials. It has gladly and voluntarily abided by a code of censorship."

"The American press has met the test of our greatest national crisis with courage, loyalty and integrity, and to the members of the Newspaper Association Managers, as representatives of that press, I am happy to send greetings."

"Publishers of United States have given America by far the freest, most interesting and most informative press in the world," declares Thomas E. Dewey, governor of New York and republican nominee for president, in his National Newspaper Week statement. He says:

Miss Carlyle Sent to Free China Hospital

ORENCO — Miss Elizabeth Carlyle, with about 100 other missionaries and business people, were evacuated from Fukin Province, China the second week in June and sent to Western China or free China. She was in Kunming, Yunnan Province three weeks before getting passage on a plane for Chungking, a three-hour ride by air. She has been assigned to work in a hospital which is being repaired and ready for opening the first of October. She says Chungking does not show the effects of the bombing of two years ago as she had expected. There are lots of buildings going up and much activity everywhere. A few days after her arrival, the city suffered much damage from a typhoon which tore tile from the roofs and a brick wall gave way and fell on one side of a hospital burying three people under debris six feet deep.

Vanderlip (Agnes Imlay) of Van Nuys, Cal., graduated from the University of California in Los Angeles in 1937. He then left for England, where he accepted a position with the London railroad. He visited his parents in California and relatives here in 1942 while in the confidential service of the British government.

He then took special training in Victoria, B. C., Alberta, Ottawa and Brackville, Canada, and became a member of the Gordon Highlander division of the Royal Canadian army, in which he served until his death.

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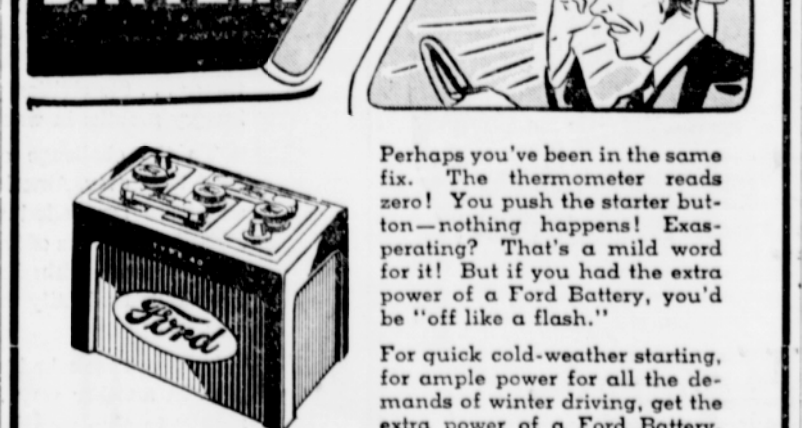

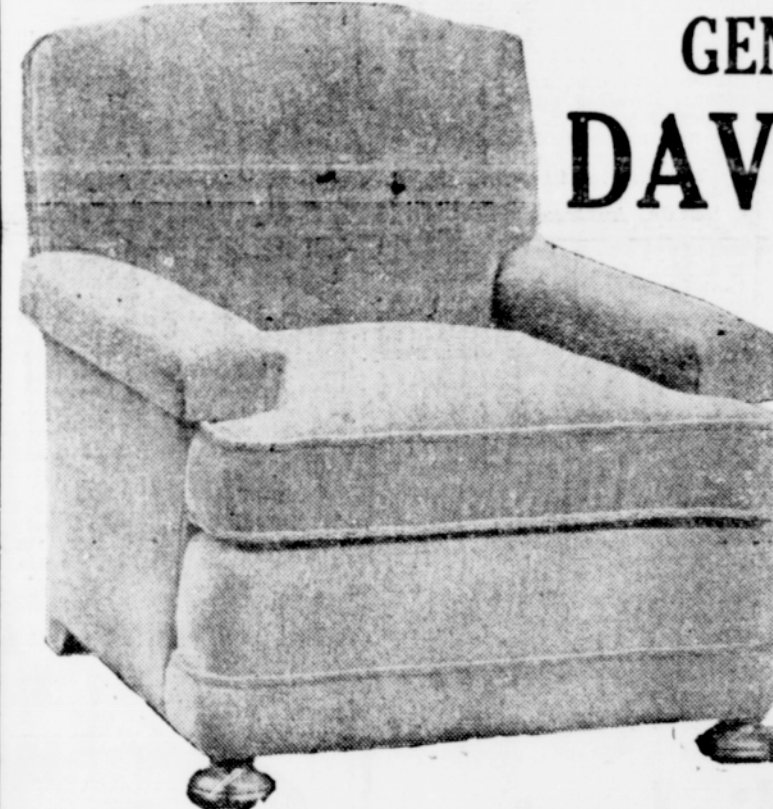
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
