SCHOLLS—Members of the Scholls community, numbering around 175 people, honored Mr. and Mrs. Ferd Groener Saturday night on the occasion of their Golden wedding anniversary with an "at home" from 7 until 10:30. Musical numbers by Mrs. William Chandler, Mrs. J. M. Streicher and Bert Rowell were given and Rev. Sibley gave a short address, preceding the singing of old-time songs by those present. Many beautiful gifts were received by the couple, among them a sheaf of 50 red rose buds, tied with a gold ribbon, from friends in the community. Members of the Scholls Women's club served about

the rooms during the evening. The marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Groener occurred October 16, 1894, at the Cahow home, now the Easter farm, when Mable Cahow, daughter of James and Samantha Cahow, became the bride of Ferdinand Groener, son of John and Ellen Groener. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. D. C. Pratt, Evangelical minister, who came from LaFayette to preside at the wedding. The Cahow family, in which Mrs. Groener was the third child, came to Dayton from Nebraska in 1893, later moving to Scholls. Mr. Groener was born in the Wood place, the family later building and moving to the large white house across from their present home to the family home, he later took his bride, where they lived until the erection of the beautiful home where the reception party was held. Of the wedding party who were present 30 years ago, Mrs. Meta Landy of Laurel, was present at Saturday night's gathering. Mrs. Blanche Greenwood, a sister of Mrs. Groener, who now makes her home with them, was also a member of the wedding group. The Groeners have gained wide respect and genuine liking by their work in civic and community affairs, as well as in church circles.
