Buxton Man Gets Jap and Saber In Saipan Battle
Originally written by Sgt. Charles R. Vandergrift of Cincinnati, Ohio, a marine corps combat correspondent, the following article appeared in the Forest Grove News Times.

SAIPAN—A Buxton tank driver, who flashed a Jap captain out of a clump of trees, killed him with a clip of 45 calibre ammunition when the latter charged. The fourth marine division tank man, Pfc. Merlin G. Watson, 22, had participated in a joint tank-artillery advance. The tanks pulled back and the men were stretching their legs. After opening his one-man attack by hurling a smoke grenade which landed only five feet from Watson, the Jap rushed out of his hiding spot.

"He was only 15 feet away, and running right at me. The saber was part way out when I saw him. I drew my automatic and started firing. Five slugs ripped into him before he finally dropped at my feet."

The saber spoken of by Pfc. Watson is on display in the Argus window.

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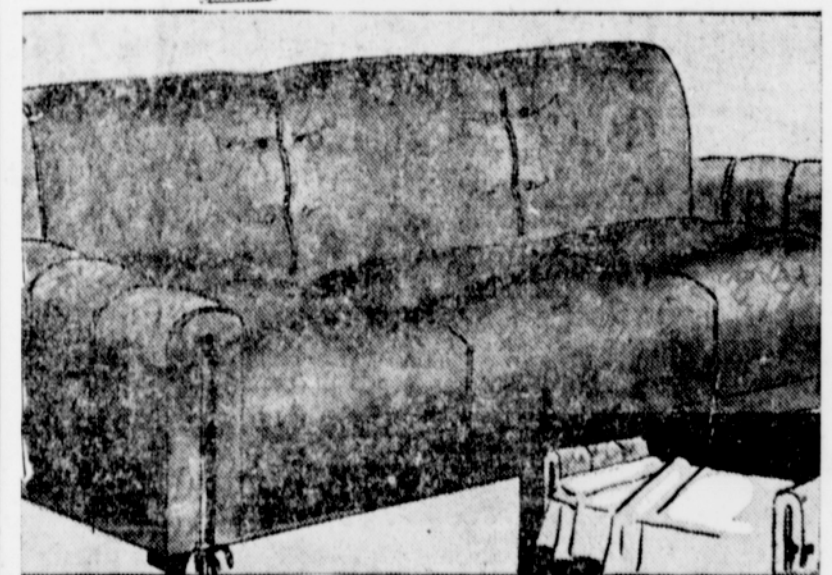
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
