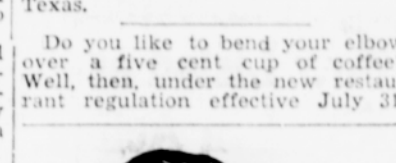

Of course, the word "home" means something different to every fighting man. For home is a lot of little things! A garden or a work bench—well-thumbed books...a mellow glass of beer with friends.

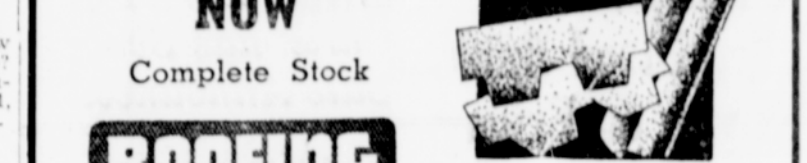
