Death Sudden for Mary Susbauer

Cornelius friends were shocked and grieved to learn of the sudden death of Mrs. Mary Susbauer on Saturday morning. With her daughter, Emilie Susbauer, Mrs. Susbauer had gone to Portland on Friday evening and had spent the night at the home of her brother. On Saturday morning she attended the regular morning services at St. Agatha Catholic church in Portland with her sister, and it was here that Mrs. Susbauer died.

Mary Schmitt was born April 10, 1890, at Sharpsburg, Ohio, daughter of Mary and Charles Schmitt. At the age of 16 she moved with her parents to Oregon and the family located in the Ken Hill district where her father operated a saw mill.

On April 30, 1899, Mary was married to Michael Susbauer at St. John's Catholic church in Oregon City. They located at Canby for the first few years of their marriage, then moved to what is still known as the Susbauer farm near Cornelius where they lived until 23 years ago when they moved to the present home in Cornelius. Mr. Susbauer preceded his wife in death in August, 1939.

The deceased is survived by eight children: Mayme C. Susbauer, Cornelius; H. E. Susbauer, Hillsboro; Carl, Salem; Mrs. H. B. Flaherty, Portland; Wilfred, Wainie; Leo, Portland; Mrs. H. F. Dober, Sherwood; and Keith, Hillsboro.

There are five grandchildren: one grandson, Harley Flaherty, is in the U. S. Army Air Corps; four sisters, Mrs. Charles Heuras, Canby; Mrs. Charles Schmitt, Portland; Mrs. L. G. Briggs, Oregon City; Mrs. Ernest Ford, Hillsboro; and one brother, Charles Schmitt of Portland.

Mrs. Susbauer was a lifelong member of the Catholic church, being a member of St. Alexander's church in Cornelius, where she was active in the work of the church and Altar Society, having held offices in the society for many years.

Interment was at Visitation cemetery at Veroport.

Community Auction Slated on Saturday

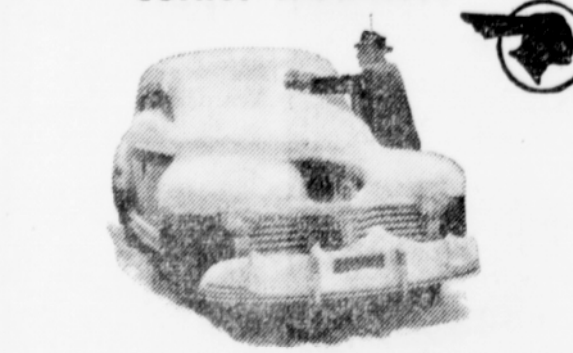
