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State Schools of Higher Education Plan for Large Service Enrollment

A greatly increased enrollment in Oregon's schools of higher education is expected after the war, declared J. F. Cramer, dean of extension and summer schools for the state system, in speaking before a joint meeting of the Rotary and Lions clubs here Thursday in the chamber of commerce on "The Immediate Future of Higher Education."

At least 50,000 of the 125,000 Oregonians now in the service are under the age of 25 and 50 per cent of these are eligible for education. At assistance on the collegiate level under the GI bill of rights, according to Dean Cramer. The two major programs are planning for enrollments ranging from 7,500 to 10,000 each based on experience following World War I and after the depression.

Buildings Great Need
Adequate buildings for the expected large enrollments will be a big problem, asserted speaking on the subject of buildings in all schools were overcrowded at the peak student load of 11,513 in 1939-40. Enrollment at U. O. S. C. is 8,500. In the past 15 years Oregon has only spent \$100,000 of appropriated funds for new buildings at the schools of higher education, a crisis being averted only through the use of federal funds and student building fees. As a result of the war, the state is obligated for years ahead, he said.
