TYV Basketball Jamboree Set Newberg Dec. 22

Tualatin-Yamhill valley 1944 basketball season will get under way December 22 with the annual hoop jamboree at the Newberg high school gymnasium, according to the schedule released this week by TYV officials. Schedule of regular games will start on January 5 as follows:

Dick (Red) Twenge, rampaging "one-man gang" of the championship Newberg Tigers, was unanimously chosen for the Tualatin-Yamhill valley league coaches' Hillsboro Argus all star football team for the third straight year when compiling of ballots for the 1944 mythical aggregation was completed this week. Only other repeater from the 1943 first team was Hillsboro's lanky halfback speedster, Jack Doyle, also unanimous choice.

Coach Al Bogue's high-scoring Hillsboro Spartans, holder of second place in the TYV standings, dominated the 12-man all-star first team with a total of five gridgers. Newberg, winner of the TYV title this year for the fourth straight year, and the third place Beaverton Beavers placed two men each on the all-star, while the fourth place McMinnville Grizzlies, the fifth place Forest Grove Vikings and the sixth place Tigard team placed one each.

Coaches' Players Aid

TYV for TYV all-stars was conducted by the sports department of the Hillsboro Argus, league coaches and players co-operating in the poll included Loren Douglas of Newberg, Gene Duncan of Beaverton, Art Brauchmann of Forest Grove, J. P. Brown of West Linn, Hal Smith of Tigard, Ken Hulbert of Tillamook, Hal Smith of McMinnville and Bogue of Hillsboro.

The resulting all-star machine presents a five-man backfield combination that could hold its own with the best in the state in passing, ball-packing, shifty open field running, power and defense. The forward wall combines plenty of weight and speed for a powerful offense and a rugged defense. Of the 12 players selected nine were seniors, two juniors and one sophomore.

Dick Twenge Captain

Honor of captaining the 1944 TYV all-star combination at one of the half-back positions by virtue of unanimous selection for three straight years goes to Twenge. The Tigers' carrot-topped triple-threat back wound up four years of grid competition this season, every one of these years on a championship TYV squad. Following through on the state-wide reputation won in 1943, Twenge continued to set the pace for league ball carriers during the 1944 season and earned the title of "one-man gang" by sparking the Tigers to another loop championship. He received all seven of the possible all-star votes again this year.

Jack Doyle, Halfback

Doyle, shifty junior halfback for

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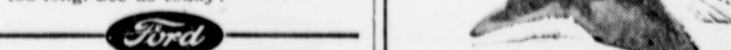
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Forest Grove sophomore, with three votes. Both players gave a good account of themselves in a tough position during the league play. Pushing the two tackle selected were Beaverton's VanHynning and Hillsboro's Faber with two votes apiece.

Amburn, Half Guards

Balloting for guard spots on the mythical squad was exceptionally close with Bill Amburn, 220-pound Tigard senior, and Lynn Hall, Hill's scrappy 155-pound senior guard, getting the nod with three votes each. Crowding them all the way were Beaverton's Gervais and Schwanke of Hillsboro with two votes. Amburn had the season in a fullback spot but later shifted into a guard position. Hall made up for his lack of weight by plenty of fight, and turned in a lot of funny ball-carrying on occasion.

McKinney Center

In the keystone spot was Hillsboro's senior center, exceptionally close with four out of the possible seven votes. McKinney turned in an almost flawless job at centering the ball all season, called defensible signals for the Spartans and had an uncanny knack of diagnosing opponents' plays. Tied for the reserve selection with two votes each were Waters of Forest Grove and Newton of Newberg.

Voting for the all-star team was widespread, 38 of the 83 starting TYV players receiving mention in the ballot. This would seem to indicate that many of the outstanding players in the league had good days and bad days against various opponents. The all-star selection for 1944 then probably includes those TYV gridgers who turned in most consistent performances all season.

Hillsboro's Spartan hoopers got down to training in earnest this week as they started preparations for the opening basketball of the season December 16 at Astoria against the strong Fishermen quintet. After starting with an opening turnout of about 125 men, Coach Ozzie Osmundson cut the squad to 16 players this week and Coach Al Bogue reduced his B outfit to 15.

Five lettermen from the 1944 squad are included in the A line-up—Willis Stark, Jack Doyle, Bob Amacher, Bob MacKenzie, and Bob Morrison. Others on the squad are Bruce Campbell, Bob Rasmussen, Lester Clark, Willie Laird, David Frank, Howard Frazier, Bob Holz-nagel, Walt McKinney, Forrest Hennings, Jack Siegel and Orville Schoen.
