District Rotary Leader to Make Official Visit

William D. Shannon of Seattle, district governor of Rotary International, will make an official visit and speak before a joint meeting of the Hillsboro and Forest Grove Rotary clubs in the chamber of commerce rooms at 6:30 o'clock tonight (Thursday). E. A. Griffith will be program chairman.

Governor Shannon will advise and assist the officers of the two clubs on matters pertaining to club administration and Rotary service activities. He is one of the 140 governors of Rotary International who are supervising the activities of 3,234 Rotary clubs with over a quarter of a million members in more than 50 countries throughout the world.

The 101st district of Rotary International includes 95 clubs in Oregon, Washington, Idaho, British Columbia and Alaska. Despite the war, this world-wide service organization continues to grow in numbers and in strength. Since July 1, 1943, 150 new Rotary clubs have been organized in 13 countries of the Americas and in Australia, Ceylon, China, England, Finland, India, Kenya, New Zealand, Northern Ireland, Sweden, Switzerland and the Union of South Africa.

Rotary Christmas party will be held in the chamber of commerce rooms Thursday night, December 14. L. B. Hall is arranging the program.

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H. W. Prickett, Veteran Grove Undertaker, Dies

Harley Wilson Prickett, Forest Grove undertaker, died at his home in Forest Grove Sunday morning after an illness of several years. Funeral services were held at the Forest Grove Undertaking company chapel Wednesday afternoon.

It was Mr. Prickett's personal request that commitment be made at the Portland crematorium and at a later date final rites will be held at the family plot at Banks cemetery.

Deceased is survived by his wife, Anna, a daughter, Fern P. Hutchins, two brothers, John and Will of Forest Grove, and one grandson, Michael John Hutchins.

Mr. Prickett was born December 29, 1884, in Nodaway county, Missouri, the fifth of a family of six, the son of Nathan and Malvra Prickett. The family came to Oregon when he was two years old and settled 10 miles north of Forest Grove where he attended public school. As a young man he worked as a clerk in the hardware store at Banks, working there for a period of nine years.

During February and March of 1916 he was employed by Victor Limber, a well known mortician of Vancouver, Wash., and in December of 1916 he operated a funeral home at Canby, Oregon. He later conducted the funeral home at Banks for five years and in May of 1921 transferred his business to Forest Grove, attaining a partnership with the late J. S. Buxton. This association was continued until May 1, 1918, when Mr. Buxton retired and Mr. Prickett assumed full ownership of the business. He continued active in the business until four years ago when illness forced him to withdraw from the work.

On October 13, 1933, he opened to the people of Forest Grove and Western Washington county the present funeral home, showing his faith in the community in which he served so many years.

On October 1, 1939, he was united in marriage to Hattie L. Hildnick, who died October 29, 1915. On January 1, 1917, he was married to the sister of his deceased wife, Anna, who survives him.

Mr. Prickett held several fraternal affiliations, those being a Blue Lodge Mason, Knights of Pythias, I. O. O. F., and was a member of the Forest Grove chamber of commerce and the Rotary club.

Ribbons of Wire...

VITAL ARTERIES OF VICTORY

NO doubt you have driven along hundreds of miles of Oregon highways, never noticing the tiny, ribbon-like wires that stretch in an endless belt from one city to another.

These copper colored, ribbon-like wires, suspended from cross arms of poles are the life blood of our war effort. For through these pathways of power flow 115,000 volts of man-made lightning—115,000 volts of war power to feed 67,000 war jobs and 20,000 war farms.

The picture shown at the right would not be very impressive unless you knew the really vital job it has already done in its short life. For instance, a vessel maneuvering in the river a short time ago snagged its anchor on the sub-marine cables from the St. Johns Sub-station, which feeds vital war plants, rolling mills, lumber mills, and blast furnaces.

The sub-marine cable was a total loss. But this new line, shown in the picture, not yet complete and coming from PGE Station E, was hurried into service so that only a very few hours of valuable war work were lost. Without this line, days, perhaps even weeks would have been required to restore warpower to these critical plants.

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
