**Buildings Need Of Education in Oregon Revealed**

SILVERTON — Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, physical and chairman of the building committee of the state board of higher education, has released a booklet just issued by the board explaining the postwar building requirements of Oregon higher education. It gives the background of the board's 10-year building program and tells why state help is needed to care for the certain postwar influx of students.

Dr. Kleinsorge has sent copies of the illustrated booklet to members of the legislature, and other copies are being distributed from the board's central office in Eugene, from where they may be had free by any interested citizen.

Prospective building needs are not based primarily on the immediate postwar influx of veterans taking advantage of education aid, though that is certain to be large, says Dr. Kleinsorge. Rather the normal population trends of the state have been compared with the student enrollment trends, showing that prospective growth of the state alone will make plant expansion at the colleges urgent.

The program outlined in the booklet shows that the board is prepared to handle construction amounting to \$2,618,000 through self-financing projects just as soon as materials and labor are available. These will include student housing, physical education plants and some recreational facilities such as a student union building.

Unable to be financed in this manner are classroom and laboratory buildings for the first two years after the war ends, amounting to \$2,237,000. For these essential additions to the instructional facilities state funds must be provided, the booklet sets out.

In the past 15 years the board has conducted the institutions with only \$100,000 of specific legislative appropriations for buildings," Dr. Kleinsorge emphasized. "This is a record unmatched in any western state and probably in the nation."

As a result of self-financing in the past, some of the still to be paid off from student fee income, the campus buildings of the six institutions have cost the state only 52 per cent of their total cost.

The remaining 48 per cent having come from student fees, gifts, self-liquidating loans and federal grants, the booklet shows.

They have been working in a Farm Security administration labor camp at Nyssa since leaving here and have never been in a War Relocation authority camp. The family was given a clearance by the western defense command to return here before the general Japanese American exclusion order was revoked. Two of the Iwasaki boys are serving in the army.

**Laurel Family Buys Bonds for Children**

Two boys, Clifford and Raymond, are in the army. It is part to see that the boys come home as soon as possible. 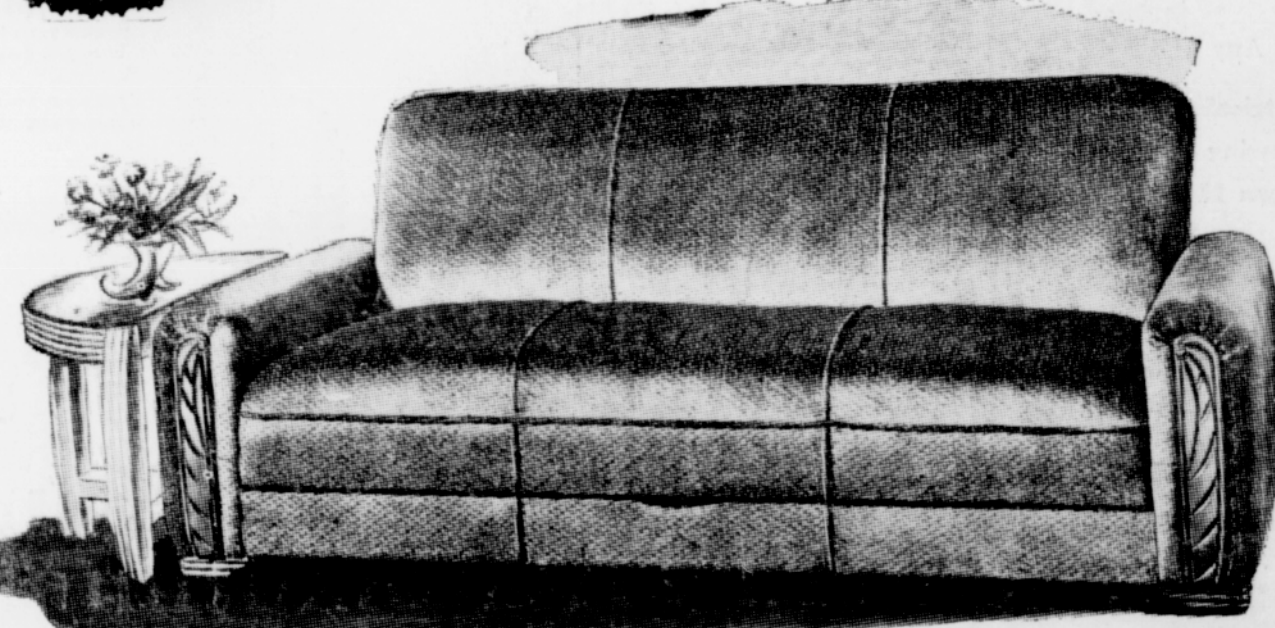
