"WAKE UP, AMERICA!" Will Recognition Of Argentina Benefit The U. S.?

DR. WEIL OPENS: A policy of blows such as non-recognition, coupled with sanctions and with help to the democratic forces by economic means, money and arms, might have effectively unseated the Argentine semi-fascist dictatorship. But we granted recognition—once granted, it cannot be withdrawn—and sanctions are inapplicable since Britain refuses to participate. So instead we wage a war of pinpricks. American ships are forbidden to enter Argentine ports, but they carried only a small percentage of U. S.-Argentine trade anyway. Argentina has large unusable dollar credits anyway. Diplomatic relations are suspended—not broken—and verbal blasts are released periodically. The U. S. Army and Navy missions continue to train Argentina's armed forces. America's attitude, the generals claim, proves anew that she is the traditional enemy of Argentina's sovereignty. Why not take this psychological weapon away from them by dropping half measures and restoring normal relations? Anti-Yankee sentiments are a main ideological basis of the dictatorship. Would kicking this prop out from under the generals and win the friendship of the Argentine people. It is a fact that the Good Neighbor Policy has remained meaningless in respect to Argentina. Implementing it by measures such as those advocated in my book would ultimately destroy, not help, the dictatorship.

MR. CHASE CHALLENGES: Why can't recognition, once granted, be withdrawn? We recognized the regimes of Hitler and Hirohito, once. And why must our diplomatic war of self-defense against the treachery of Argentine fascism continue to be a series of pinpricks? We are really a powerful nation, and when necessary we can follow up a pinprick attack with something heavier. The only way to counter the anti-Yankee propaganda of the Berlin-Madrid-Buenos Aires Axis is to make it crystal clear to the people of Argentina and their neighbors that we mean to give no quarter to fascism—the scourge of all peoples.

DR. WEIL REPLIES: Under international law, recognition isn't approval. Acceptance of a fact cannot be repudiated. But what would we achieve by now resorting to "heavier" measures advocated by the Chases and Winchells? We are declaring war on Argentina. That is what we are doing. Consider, too, that Britain has just offered Argentina a four-year renewal of the meat-ban—Buenos Aires means "no quarter" to us. If we mean "no quarter" to Argentina, why single out Argentina while maintaining good relations with dictators like Franco, Vargas and Trujillo? Instead of half measures and "pinpricks," can't we adopt one consistent world-wide policy of effectively helping the democratic forces?

MR. CHASE REPLIES: Our present policy towards fascist Argentina was taken as a military defense measure—not because we want to interfere with Argentina's internal affairs. Democratic Argentines know this; we should not be concerned because fascist Argentines don't like it. Estrada's Doctrine just does not happen to apply to this war. It is one thing to recognize a De Gaulle or a Tito government which is born in an extra-constitutional battle against fascism. It is quite another thing to recognize a fascist Argentine regime forced upon—by an insubstantial people. We cannot ask other Latin American nations to make sacrifices in this anti-fascist war if we appease fascism in Argentina.

DR. WEIL CHALLENGES: Having already recognized the regime, non-recognition isn't the issue. Our present policy is "non-intercourse"—we are not on speaking terms. Can that result in "weakening Argentina's contribution to the Wehrmacht"? It only serves to convince Argentines that the Good Neighbor Policy, promising non-interference in domestic matters, is hypocritical. Sumner Welles rightly advocates adoption of Estrada's Doctrine: automatic recognition of governments that come to power by extra-constitutional means, accepting "the fact that supreme executive authority . . . is lodged in the hands of certain individuals." "It is far easier," says he, "to maintain understanding between peoples when governments remain on speaking terms."

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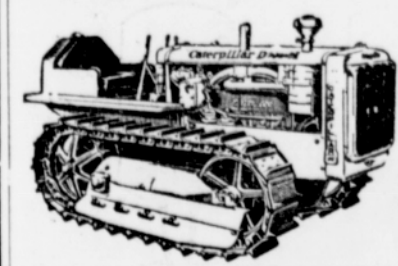
Ambulance Gets Calls

1943 legislature, he asked for an increase in appropriation sufficient to provide \$40 a month payment, designated as the minimum both in the state and federal law. "At that time," he said, "the average payment was around \$24." The average payment is now \$35 and these payments will be increased to \$40, over \$35 per cent receive from \$35 to \$40, approximately 80 per cent now receive from \$30 to \$40 supplementing and in addition to those figures is free medical service totaling in excess of \$125,000 a year. "As stated in my inaugural message in 1935, I still maintain that \$40 per month is little enough to provide sustenance and reasonable comfort for these elderly citizens."

"During the recent political campaign," said the governor, "we heard and read certain statements, innuendos, and accusations concerning the purchase by the state of Oregon and Washington of certain liquor stocks and merchandise. The matter developed in the state of Washington prior to the November election as the result of the release of certain audit in that state. Nevertheless, the good name of the state of Oregon was not harmed."

He recommended the service of "a nationally-organized firm of tax experts be engaged to survey and analyze the Oregon tax structure and report to the legislature. Capital Briefs.

The first bill, by Senators Strayer and Rand, was introduced on the first day, its purpose being to repeal the 1943 community tax law, made useless by a recent United States supreme court decision. The combined legislative experience of the members of this legislature amount to over 33 years. The oldest member in point of service is W. H. Strayer, with 15 sessions. Only two members of the 30 in the senate and 11 of the 60 in the house have not had previous legislative experience. You should have your income tax blanks by now. They were mailed Saturday.
