Red Cross Wants Men and Women For Overseas Work

To meet requests of army and navy for expanded service in all overseas theatres of war, a total of 40 men and women must be recruited from the seven western states immediately in various job classifications, for Red Cross overseas service.

This was the statement of O. B. Gates, chairman of county chapter, following receipt of a notification from Verne Simmons, manager of Pacific area headquarters in San Francisco, and a request that the local chapter redouble its efforts in recruiting its share of this vital and needed personnel from the men and women of Washington county.

Now, more than ever, Mr. Gates continued, men who are American citizens, can pass a rigid physical examination, are between 20 and 50 and who have had a college education or the equivalent, and administrative, executive or public welfare or social work experience will discover a vital role in one of the Red Cross classifications now open to new applicants. He stressed that high personal qualifications and high personal qualifications are the main basis upon which selection will be made. "Fifty-nine percent of the field directors are now open, in which capacity a man would work with able-bodied troops in Red Cross welfare and recreation programs. He is also listed as urgently and immediately needed." Mr. Gates pointed out that men must be citizens and must be able to furnish proof of draft deferment for valid reasons.

The field is similarly open for many classifications for women. He continued, "Although individual job qualifications vary, women who are between 20 and 45, have a college degree or the equivalent, and experience in the fields of recreation, physical education, drama, arts and crafts, or proven executive and organizational experience should investigate by calling the Red Cross chapter nearest them. The largest need is for 198 staff assistants, age 25-35, to work in Red Cross clubs, clubmobiles, and recreation programs. The greatest need is for 36 hospital recreation workers, age 25-45; 24 hospital aides, age 25-45, and three assistant club directors, age 25-45. Forty women stenographers, age 25-35, with at least three years' experience in shorthand, typing and office procedure are also on the immediate recruitment lists."

Mr. Gates stated that other classifications requiring training and experience in fields of social work, include openings for 22 hospital staff social workers, and service workers, and 10 directors. "In addition, there are many openings in all classifications for domestic assignment, but we feel our most urgent obligation is providing adequate personnel to our fighting men overseas.
