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Local District Of Gasco Shows Biggest Increase

With a gain of 8.3 per cent in number of gas customers and 10.1 per cent in volume of gas sales, the Hillsboro district of Portland Gas & Coke company led all others in rate of growth during 1944, according to a statistical summary received by J. A. H. Dodd, district manager.

At the end of 1944 the 85th year of the gas company's existence, there were 4290 gas users in the Hillsboro district. This was an increase of 339 over the previous year.

Demand for gas in the district totaled 257,360.92 cubic feet for the year, an increase of 24,623,000 cubic feet over 1943.

Communities in the district include Hillsboro, Forest Grove, Cornelius, Aloha, Beaverton and Newberg.

Total number of customers on Portland Gas & Coke company's system was 104,452, a new record. Gain over 1943 was 4943, or 5.5 per cent. Dodd reported.

Gas is being used for cooking, water heating or other domestic purposes by a total of 91,947 customers, also a new high. Total gas sale for the year was 6,248,702.000 cubic feet, an increase of 323,003,000 cubic feet, or 5.5 per cent.

Much of the company's output of gas and by-products was reported to be going directly or indirectly into war production activities.

Briguet deliveries for the company also reached a new high in 1944 with a total of 94,062 tons, an increase of 2962 tons over 1943, the previous record year. In addition to the large quantities of briquets sold for house heating, a substantial tonnage went to poultry farms for brooder operation.

Industrial importance of the gas company was indicated by its 1944 pay roll, which totaled \$1,927,000, including construction work. This was a gain of 7.5 per cent over 1943.

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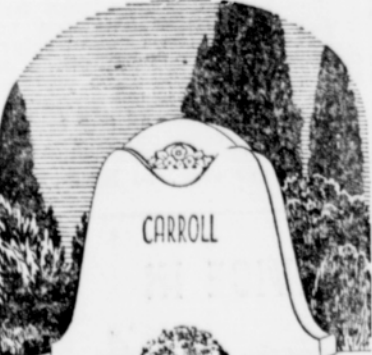
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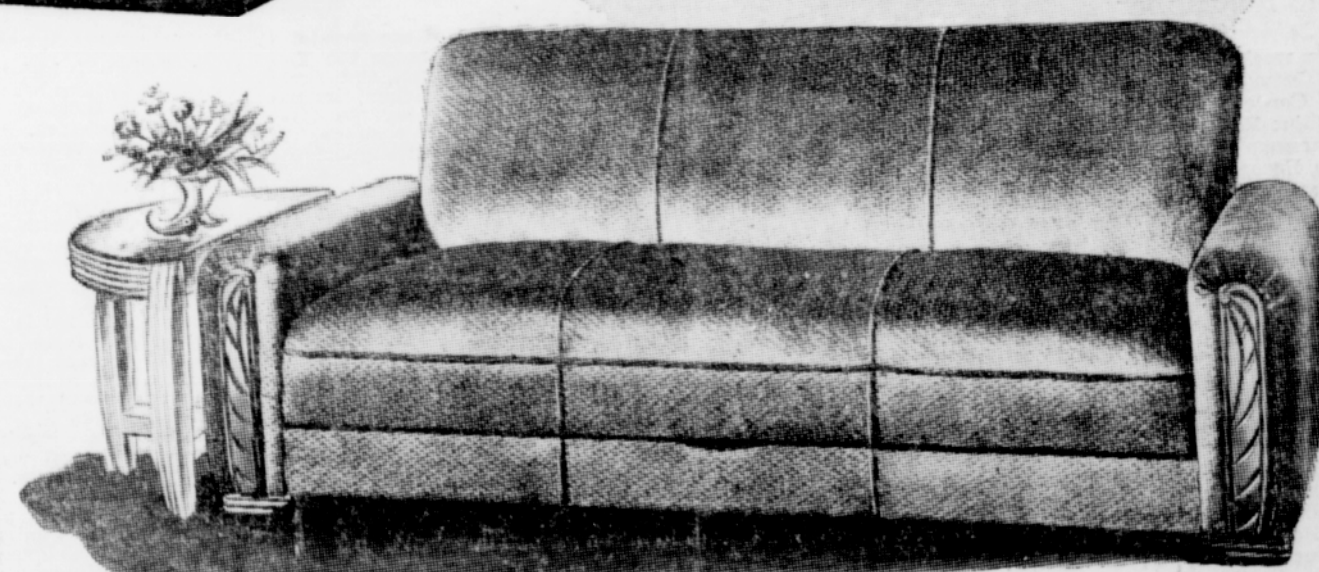
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
