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Mileage Ration Form Must Be Retained

All operators of passenger cars with basic "A" rations must have "mileage rationing records" to be eligible to apply for any gasoline ration. E. W. Eggen, district OPA mileage rationing representative, emphasizes.

These mileage record forms replaced the old tire rationing record, on which was kept a list of all gasoline rations issued to the vehicle.

Without this important record form, no motorist may be issued a "B" or "C" supplemental ration, Eggen explained.

Information has been received from local OPA boards that many motorists did not understand the use of the record form and lost or destroyed theirs.

No supplemental rations or appeal of furlough rations for cars with basic "A" rations may be issued to an applicant who does not present his mileage rationing record with his supplemental gasoline application, Eggen emphasized. In cases where a motorist was not issued a mileage rationing record, or it was lost or destroyed, he should apply at once to his local board for a duplicate.

Iowa Man New University Head

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON—Dr. Harry K. Newburn, dean of the college of liberal arts at the University of Iowa, was named president of the University of Oregon by the State Board of Higher Education at their January meeting. It was announced in Portland this week.

Dr. Newburn, who will head the state university which has been under the direction of Acting President Orlando John Hollis since the death of President Donald M. Erb this week.

In December, 1943, is recognized as one of the most outstanding younger educators in this country. Born in Cuba, Ill., January 1, he has just passed his 39th birthday.

A graduate of Western Illinois Teachers college, Macomb, Ill., in 1922, the Oregon president-elect received his M. A. and Ph. D. degrees at the University of Iowa, taking the doctorate in 1933.

Beginning his career with five years service in the Illinois public schools in 1931 he went to the University of Iowa as part-time principal of the University high school. After receiving his doctoral degree he was made a full-time staff member. He was appointed dean of the college of liberal arts in September, 1941.

The newly chosen president is a member of Phi Delta Kappa and Kappa Delta Pi, national academic honor societies, and a member of the Kiwanis club. He was married in June, 1928, to Wandalee Brady, and they have two children, Jacqueline, 14, and Robert, 12.

Dean Newburn visited the Oregon campus several weeks ago and made many friends among members of the faculty, who were impressed with his personality as well as his educational record and ideas.

Prep Newspaper Contest Slated

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—Annual high school newspaper contest has been announced by George Turnbull, acting dean of the school of journalism at the university. The contest will be held under the direction of Robert C. Hall, associate professor of Journalism and superintendent of the University Press. Mr. Hall has directed these yearly contests among the publication of the high schools of Oregon for a number of years.

To enter the contest high schools must send copies of two issues published during the current school year to the school of journalism at the university. All papers must be in the hands of the judges by March 15, and a fee of \$2 is charged to cover costs of judging and preparation of an intensive critique of each paper in the contest. The awards, heretofore based on the work of the previous year's staffs, will be given to the present staffs this year.

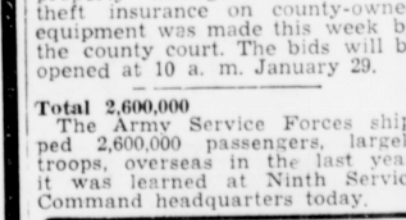
The contest is divided into several classes—weekly and biweekly mimeographed papers; monthly mimeographed papers; printed newspapers representing schools of 500 or more enrollment; printed newspapers representing schools with enrollments under 500; news notes in local papers. The best all-around newspaper in the state is awarded the Arnold Bennett Hall trophy. Judges for the contest will include three upperclass journalism students, under faculty direction.

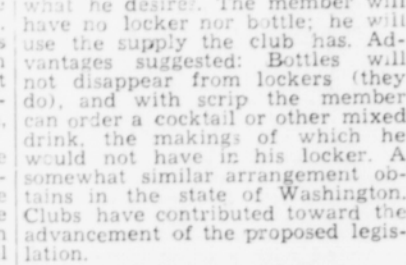
Knox Law Target
An attempt will be made to crack the Knox law by a bill permitting the sale of liquor by the drink. This is known as the "Cocktail" bill and also as the "Scrip" bill. Here is how the promoters are trying to work it. In all the regular clubs (not the pioneer night spots) members keep liquor in their lockers, and under the present regulations they are lucky to have one fifth or quart of something. The clubs wish to sell books of scrip to members and when a member wishes to hoist one he tears out a piece of scrip (approximately price 25 cents), and orders what he desires. The member will have no locker nor bottle; he will use the supply the club has. Advantages suggested: Bottles will not disappear from lockers (they do), and with scrip the member can order a cocktail or other mixed drink, the makings of which he would not have in his locker. A somewhat similar arrangement obtains in the state of Washington. Clubs have contributed toward the advancement of the proposed legislation.

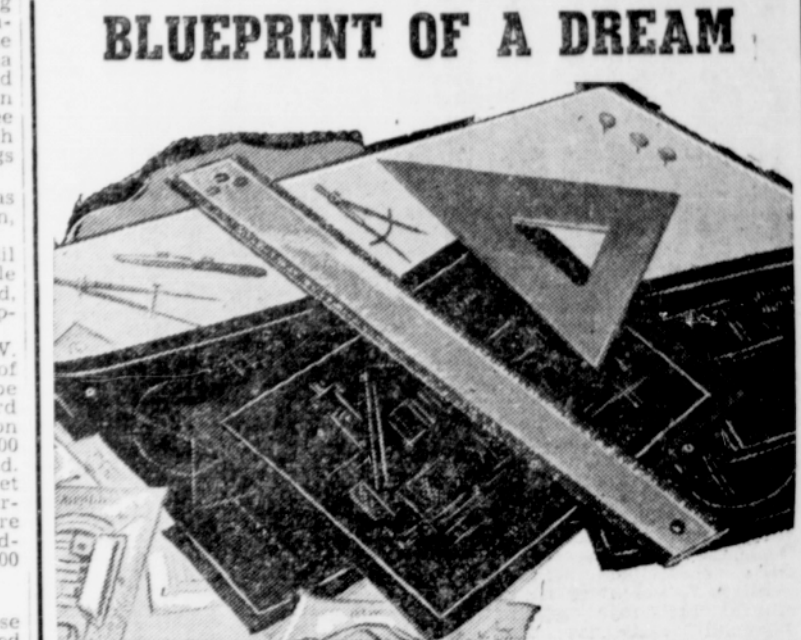
Overseas Veteran Visits
