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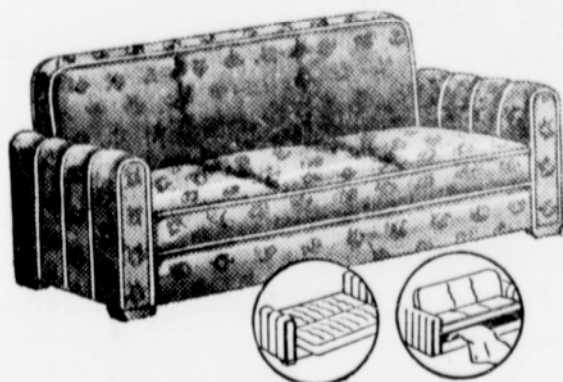
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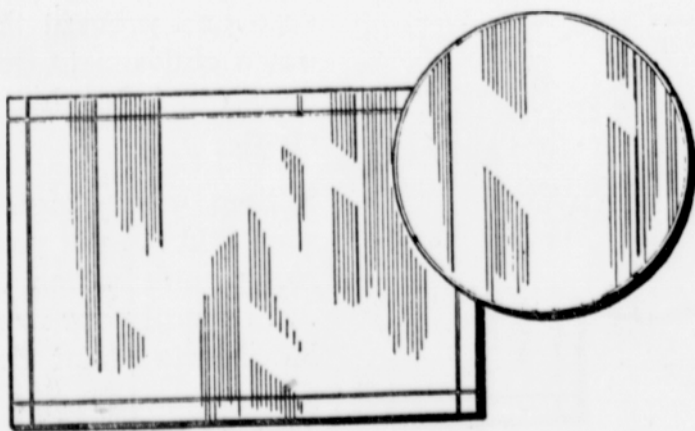
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SOMETHING TO REMEMBER

For this I get two bucks a day,
And a chance for a little ground

And a covered grassy mound.

My pal who came down here with me,

And hundreds more I do not know
Are safe now from all harm.

But when I hear of a bunch of guys
Who're safe and far away.

And there we'd let them stew.

We'd give them malaria,
Let the mosquitoes have a feast.
We'd make them bury many a lad
From north, west, south and east.

We'd make them sleep in foxholes,

We'd let them hear the wounded
moan
We'd let them see them lie
With sniper's bullets whizzing close,
With star shells in the sky.
