Federal Farm Loans Consolidate Here

being accumulated to retire by next May 15, the last of the government's paid-in surplus. During the past several years the bank also has been decentralizing its activities, giving the NFIA boards of directors the responsibility of servicing its loans and contracts. Through this program and thorough refinements in operating procedures, the bank has reduced its personnel to 83 as against 441 in 1936. Savings in operating expense since that time have amounted to more than \$640 per year.

These savings have permitted the bank to set the pace for long time interest rates at 4 per cent on all regular loans made through national farm loan associations. A 10 per cent dividend to all associations was declared on September 30, 1944. Through this new program and through other operating economies and sound business practices, the bank contemplates going on a permanent dividend-paying basis.
