Following the Camp Fire program, Mrs. Hazel Roland of Portland, state chairman of Girls' State, showed pictures of the summer activities at Silver Creek falls last year, explaining the scenes as the "movies" were shown. She paid tribute to the two girls sent by the Hillsboro unit, Norma Lou Kroeger and Jean Puhola, who held offices of state treasurer and mayor of a camp city. She stated that camp dates this year would be June 10 to 17 and that rates would be a little higher.

Staff Sgt. Dettmer of the WAC recruiting office gave a talk on the urgent need of enlistees to assist in winning the war, and stressed the dire need of more nurses to take care of the thousands of wounded men coming home, and also for overseas duty. At the conclusion of her talk Sgt. Robinson showed moving pictures of war scenes and the various activities in which women could assist the men.

Nancy Duncan of Tillamook, a granddaughter of Mrs. S. E. Olsen, was present and told of her work as a member of the Junior Auxiliary of Tillamook.

It was voted to entertain the Legionnaires next month in celebration of the 26th anniversary of the founding of the Legion. Date will be announced later.

The refreshment table was decorated in the patriotic motif with miniature Washington and Lincoln homes, and red, white and blue candles. A large cake decorated with the U. S. flag was the centerpiece.
