

County Farmers Expect to Meet Goals for Year

Washington county farmers will probably meet their 1945 production goals, according to reports made by community committees at a recent county goals meeting held in Hillsboro, reports Palmer S. Torvold, county agent. Community committees attending the meeting generally thought livestock and poultry goals could possibly be maintained. The only exceptions were the goals for dairy and spring pigs. Indications in the county are that the number of cows for spring farrowing is considerably short of the goal and that there has been a slight decrease in the number of dairy cows.

Indications are that most of the crop goals will be attained. Among the crop goals with a shortage of supply likely to occur are radish, rutabaga and red clover for seed. Increased production of these crops is highly desirable according to indications. The war food administration is no longer asking for all out production of agricultural commodities as of the way, state AAA officials indicated, as surpluses have been built up in a number of commodities. However, generally speaking, if production can be maintained somewhere at the same level as in 1944, it is likely that few, if any, shortages will occur.

Youngsters Earn Million Dollars On Oregon Farms

Approximately 18,000 Oregon boys and girls, who accounted for 54,704 youth placements in farm jobs made through county farm labor offices in 1944 earned more than a million dollars and picked crops valued at \$10,990,600. Such is the estimate of Russell M. Adams, assistant state farm labor supervisor in charge of youth activities in the OCS extension service, made on the basis of youth reports from county farm labor assistants.

While detailed figures are not obtainable on all youths who helped with Oregon's 1944 harvest, reasonably complete figures are available for the 172 organized youth groups which are estimated to have accounted for about a fourth of the total youth placements.

Boys and girls were placed in harvest jobs by county farm labor offices in 33 of Oregon's 36 counties last year, Adams reports. Placements were made in 15,150, followed by the city of Portland with 9582, Lane 8292, Yamhill 5146, Linn 3283, Benton 3086, and Clackamas 2923. None of the totals includes the thousands of youths who went out on picking jobs without registering at farm labor offices.

Youth placements worked in 11 different crops, including berries, beans, filberts, cherries, onions, peaches, prunes, pears, flax, hops and tomatoes and in addition did weeding and hoeing. The 172 platoons harvested 15,564 tons of crops valued to the grower at \$2,566,000 with a total income to the youthful pickers of \$239,400. Many platoons went from one crop to another as the season progressed. The highest number of platoons, 154, picked berries, 77 worked in beans and 29 picked filberts. The average gross total cash return to the youngsters was \$136,892, an average of \$3.15 a day per individual. Berries ranked second with a total picking income of \$75,622, or an individual average of \$2.23 a day. For all crops, the average earnings of \$3.63 a day.

Early Care Cuts High Mortality Of Dairy Calves

A little extra care of calves soon after birth will help reduce the nation's present high mortality of dairy calves, says Harold Ewalt, assistant extension specialist in dairy husbandry at OSC. Ewalt reports that the American Veterinary Medical association has issued a series of "calf-saver" suggestions which are both applicable and timely here in Oregon. These suggestions, with some modifications by Ewalt, follow:

"Keep the expecting mother near the barn, where she can be watched. Do not allow her to seek a far corner of the pasture where she cannot be observed and helped if necessary.

"Give the cow rations rich in bran, molasses and feed also plenty of clean, fresh water. "Provide a dry, clean, well-bedded maternity stall. Cows are highly susceptible to infection at this time, so sanitation is important.

"Be sure the calf receives several good feedings of the cow's first milk. This milk, containing A and other elements which the young animal must have.

"Prevent calf pneumonia and secure by keeping newborn calves in clean, well-ventilated pens. Do not shut calves in poorly lighted, unventilated quarters, or in cold, draughty quarters where pneumonia may be contracted.

"If the calf begins to show symptoms of illness, have a veterinarian examine it promptly. Some of the new sulfa drugs have proven highly effective in reducing pneumonia losses among young animals.

Authorities have estimated that more than one-fifth of all calves die before they reach milking age.

Oregon Men Study Flax Markets on East Coast

Two men from the Oregon agricultural experiment station have gone east to spend several weeks studying the market prospects for Oregon flax fiber after the war demand ceases. They are Dr. D. D. Hill, head of the farm crops department and chairman of the Oregon flax and linen board, and Dr. D. B. DeLoach, agricultural economist of the station.

These two specialists will visit and confer with linen manufacturers and other users of flax fiber in Washington, Philadelphia, New York, Boston, and Webster, Mass., before returning to Oregon about the middle of February.

Loans Available To War Veterans

Washington County's Farm Security Administration committee has been designated by the Veterans' Administration to serve as the county veterans' loan committee to certify F1 farm loan guaranties to the Veterans' Administration.

A special school for committee members held recently at Salem was attended by Lorraine Putnam, Henry Johnson, and Chester Wohler for their new assignment. Other members of the committee not able to attend were Carl Voges.

New responsibilities of the FSA committee in connection with the veterans' farm loan guaranties are entirely separate from the farm security program and do not involve credit. GI services of committee will be carried out under the supervision of the Veterans' Administration. Madson said. "The committee will also continue its regular duties of reviewing and passing on FSA loans and advising borrowers and prospective borrowers."

Provisions of the GI farm loan guaranty program make it possible for honorably discharged veterans to secure farm loans from banks, commercial credit organizations and individuals with a guarantee up to \$2,000 for purchase of farms, farm buildings, equipment or livestock. After the veteran has qualified and a commercial credit agency or bank has agreed to make the loan, the application will be reviewed by the veterans' loan committee to insure the veteran has a good likelihood of repaying the loan.

FSA's loans for livestock, equipment, water facilities and farm buildings will continue to be available to veterans and family-type farmers who cannot secure suitable credit and management assistance from usual sources. The GI farm loan guaranties may be applied to loans from federal agencies, but there may be instances where FSA or farm loan guaranties may be used to supplement loans made under the GI guarantee.

Balanced Dairy Program Given

A well balanced dairy program with regard to feed supplies, labor available, and the long-time future of the dairy enterprise is the objective of the national eight-point dairy program now advocated throughout the United States, says Harold Ewalt, assistant dairy extension specialist at Oregon State college.

The program, sponsored by the U. S. department of agriculture, the war food administration and the state extension services, applies equally well to the state of Oregon as elsewhere, Ewalt declares. As in previous years, the eight points are aimed toward bringing about maximum production for wartime demand, while recognizing the need for a good balance looking toward postwar conditions. The eight points included in the program follow:

1. Grow an abundance of high quality roughage.
2. Balance your herd with your feed supply.
3. Keep production records on each cow in your herd.
4. Practice disease-control methods.

5. Produce milk and cream of the highest quality.
6. Adopt labor-saving methods.
7. Take care of your land.
8. Develop a sound breeding program.

AAA Sign-up Meetings Set County Areas

AAA practices for 1945 have been announced by the state AAA organization and include some of the following, which may be of particular interest to Washington county farmers, Palmer S. Torvold, county agent, states.

Practices include the application of ground limestone on any crop of pasture land, applications of phosphate to legumy and pastures and legumy green manure crops, harvesting of certain lespedeza and grass seeds, drainage practices, reorganization of farm practices, seeding or re-seeding permanent pasture, grazing land, and clearing weed control, and a number of others. A complete list of the practices as applied to Washington county is being mailed to all those who have participated in the 1944 program and to others who have indicated a desire to receive them.

In order to participate in the 1945 AAA practice program, it is necessary for each farmer to sign up his farm, Torvold said. Sign-up meetings will be held in the various AAA communities beginning February 12, as follows: District 2, Kinton Grange hall Monday, February 12, 9 a. m. to 10 p. m.

District 4, Union gym near Cedar Mills, Thursday and Friday, February 15 and 16. All day Thursday and Friday evening. District 5, Hillsboro county court room Wednesday and Thursday, February 14 and 15, all day Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, February 16 and 17, Friday night and all day Saturday.

District 6, Gaston Knights of Pythias hall Thursday and Friday, February 15 and 16, Thursday all day and Friday evening. District 7, Forest Grove chamber of commerce Tuesday and Wednesday, February 13 and 14, Tuesday all day and evening, Wednesday evening only.

District 11, Laurel community hall Thursday and Friday, February 16 and 17, Thursday and Friday all day, Friday evening. Sign-up meetings for other communities will be announced later.

1944 net earnings of \$29,123.39 in contrast with \$23,112.24 in 1943.

Additions and betterments in 1944 totaled \$11,414.69. This was divided as follows: Source of supply, \$104.20; transmission system, \$206.39; distribution system, \$8,369.05; office, \$30; transportation equipment, \$20; tools and work equipment, \$2,165.05.

The 1945 tentative budget includes \$174.52 cash on hand, \$86,440 anticipated revenue, \$41,640 war bonds owned and \$10,159.98 sinking fund, giving a total available fund of \$139,244.50. Proposed expenditures listed: Interest on bonded debt, \$4,110; bond retirement, \$8,000; operation expense, \$21,357; maintenance expense, \$8,000; preliminary survey, \$6,000; authorized additions and betterments, \$10,000; depreciation, \$15,000. Total \$82,467. This leaves a balance of \$57,777.50 available for improvements, subject to War Production Board approval. Bonds outstanding on the system as of December 31 amounted to \$156,000. Total services rendered by the system was 2,965, meters, 10,177, hydrants, 70, and miles of main 49.08. Services in 1943 totaled 1925, a gain of 140.

Much Filbert Pruning Harmful; Cuts Yields

Young filbert trees require less pruning than almost any other common orchard tree and are far more likely to suffer from over-pruning than under-pruning, says O. T. McWhorter, extension horticulturist at OSC.

As filberts come into bearing, the lower limbs are best left on to hasten the development of the tree and to increase the production of early filberts, says McWhorter. These lower limbs are somewhat of a problem in cultivating and harvesting but the fact remains that their removal will reduce yields materially.

Another common mistake in handling young filberts is to head back the scaffold branches on one, two and three-year-old trees, McWhorter adds. It may be necessary to remove an excess limb here and there, but heading back any scaffold branches is definitely harmful, experienced growers have found.
