Sale Non-Rationed Shoes Extended

Shoe retailers will have an additional week from February 19 through March 19 to sell odd shoes ration-free to customers, M. R. Collins, OPA shoe rationing representative, announced today. Termination of sales had previously been set on March 3. The additional week has been granted because shipments of "odd lot" shoes from wholesalers was delayed because of the recent freight charge, Collins explained.

Collins also explained that mail order dealers may sell stocks of odd lot shoes ration-free to other dealers during the period allowed for trade transfers, February 5 through February 24. No other retailers are permitted to sell odd lot shoes ration-free to other dealers, Collins said. Mail order actions were accepted because mail order merchandise cannot be disposed of in a limited selling period.

Collins added that if mail order dealers do not have an established wholesale price for shoes to be transferred in this manner, they may use a price not exceeding 10 per cent above cost of the shoes to the owner of the establishment.
