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Inter-American Trade Scholar B. P. W. Speaker

Feeling quite sure that it will be easy to make "good propaganda" about America when he returns to his home in Peru, Marcelo Bert, speaker for the Business and Professional Women's dinner meeting Friday night at the chamber of commerce, related some of the comparisons and differences between the peoples of Peru and those here. Bert, who was sent here to learn about the flax industry and American trade as an inter-American trade scholar, is employed at the Corvallis flax plant. While there he does the same work as any other employee and receives the same compensation.

As a background for his comparisons between Peruvian and American women, Bert explained that 20 or 30 years ago women in Peru "were just nothing" but now they are almost equal to the men, although they do not vote. Chile is the only Latin American country where women have that privilege.

In speaking of the professional women, he pointed out that Peruvian women may take up any profession, just as here, only fewer do so because Peruvian women have no co-education, while the colleges do. Working hours are longer in Peru with a lower wage scale than here, but lunch is from two to three hours long because the people like to sleep or swim during that time, and then work later at night.

Although Peru is six times as large as Oregon, there are seven times as many people (only 10 per cent of the population is pure Indian) while 50 per cent is pure Indian. Most of the white population lives along the coast where the largest number of industries are.

Agriculture, mining, which is chiefly copper, and oil wells make up the larger industries, with sawmills farther back in the mountains along the rivers. Small villages can be found far back in the mountains, the same as they were two centuries ago.

Bert stated that he, like most Latin Americans who come here, is fascinated with the United States but that few settle here because they feel unequal to withstanding American competition due to lack of education, training and mechanical knowledge.
