Baldwin Visits

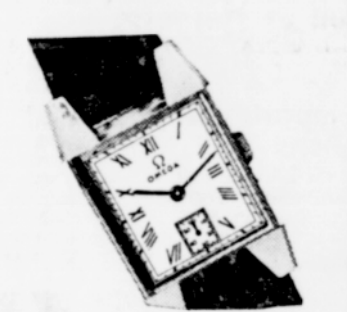
