Marine Flyer Returns from South Pacific

Marine Captain S. Howard Davis, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leon S. Davis of Laurel, recently reported at the Marine Corps Air Depot, Miramar, Cal. after logging 1190 hours as a pilot with TAG.

Operating from the Gilberts and Marshalls, the marine pilot ferried supplies throughout those groups as well as the Caroline and Mariana Islands. His transport was among the first flight to land on Tinian. On return home he evacuated wounded from Saipan.

Capt. and Mrs. Davis arrived Tuesday for a 21-day leave at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Leon Davis, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ford, at Garibaldi, and other relatives. Capt. Davis visited his parents at Hamilton Field San Rafael, Cal. before coming to Hillsboro. His mother, who planned to come north with them, was unable to secure reservations but will come soon. Mr. Davis is with the Red Cross personnel at Hamilton Field.

Captain Davis' wife, the former Geraldine Ford, lives at Garibaldi. He was graduated from Hillsboro union high school and from Pacific university at Forest Grove. He entered flight training in February, 1941, and won his wings at a marine pilot in February, 1942.

Medal Awarded Posthumously

Posthumous award of the air medal to Technical Sergeant Joseph A. Sahfield was made to his father, August Sahfield of Hillsboro, in a ceremony at the Portland Army Air Base Sunday by Lt. Col. MacBrien. He was crew chief on a transport plane and has been missing in action since July 11, 1943, in the North African Sicilian campaign. His parents previously had received the Purple Heart, which was awarded posthumously. Captain Harold C. Way read the citation as follows:

"By direction of the President, the Air Medal has been posthumously awarded to Technical Sergeant Joseph A. Sahfield, Air Corps, for meritorious achievement while participating in a night aerial battle as member of a combat crew, in unarmored, unarmored and unarmored troop carrier aircraft, at an altitude of less than 800 feet, under adverse flying conditions.

"The skill and courage, the devotion to duty, exemplified by this enlisted man contributed in a large degree to the successful dropping of paratroops over designated zones and reflect great credit upon the XII Troop Carrier Command, and the United States Army Air Forces.

"Since this operation this enlisted man has been reported missing in action."
