## Early Purchases Fertilizer Urged

Shortages of commercial fertilizers can be overcome by ordering and purchasing supplies well in advance of need, says Farmer S. Torvick, county agent. Manure shortages are complicating the job of converting all available fertilizer material into usable form in time for use by farmers when the material is desired. Transportation also has been somewhat of a bottleneck to farmers who place late orders. Those who plan to use fertilizer on crops next fall should make plans and place their orders or purchase their material now. Most fertilizer materials can be stored if kept in a dry place.

## Cover Crop Seed Program Extended

Provision to permit sale to the government of 1944 cover crop seeds which cannot be cleaned and tested before the March 10 closing date on the 1944 seed purchase program has been announced by the state AAA committee, reports John W. Kauna, county AAA chairman.

Because of reports from smaller warehouses that a considerable amount of seed could not be cleaned by the March 10 deadline, both dealers and producers will be permitted to file an intention to sell seed to the government as soon as it can be processed. Subject to the approval of the county AAA committee, an intention to sell by March 10 will qualify for government purchase of the amount of seed specified. The time required to complete cleaning must be specified on the intention.

State Forester Rogers has plans completed for the re-seeding and replanting much of the burn at a cost of \$4,000,000. New experiments may see novel methods used for re-seeding with airplanes used to spread seed on ridges and hill tops after white-footed mice and other seed-eaters have first been destroyed. Re-seed ridges would provide a seed source for the balance of the area.

More than 12½ billion feet of green timber was destroyed in the Tillamook fire, worst of all modern forest fires in Oregon. The fire started above Gales Creek on a hot afternoon August 14, 1933, and after ten days "blew up" on

August 24 and 25. Total value of the timber at pre-war prices was estimated at \$20,000,000. Payrolls lost to the state from this time were \$20,000,000. The forests burned would have supplied raw products to Portland sawmills for the next 20 years. More than 3,000 men fought the blaze under the direction of Cronemiller, who was then serving as state forester.

The Tillamook burn, which includes the Wolf creek burn, just to the north, which burned at the same time, and the Salmonberry burn, which was destroyed in the late fall the year before, covers 311,000 acres of land.

Fire struck again at the same area in 1929, destroying 67,000 acres of new growth and seed sources, and an additional 800 million board-feet of timber.

Salvage 30 Per Cent — Before the embers had cooled on this disastrous fire of 1933 the timber-holding companies pooled their resources and formed the Consolidated Timber company with Lloyd Crosby as general manager. Nearly four billion feet of timber have been salvaged and a steady battle has been waged against bugs which infest fire-killed trees. Salvage of the original cruise will run to about 30 per cent.
