

Labor Savers In Demand As Result of Tour

Many new labor saving devices and methods of simplifying farm and home tasks will make their appearance in Oregon rural communities within the next few months, judging from the interest shown in the recent series of farm and home labor saving demonstrations sponsored by the OSC extension service in Western Oregon.

Clyde Walker and Mrs. Mabel C. Mack, assistant state farm labor supervisors who were in charge of the demonstrations, report that more than 12,000 persons saw the 21 different showings. In every instance, they indicate, both men and women were intensely interested in methods of solving some of their wartime labor difficulties through labor saving machinery and work simplification.

While practically all of the numerous exhibits attracted wide attention, the draft cooler, among the pieces of home equipment, the treatment of the home-made spreaders were particularly popular. Citing 1940 census figures, Mrs. Mack pointed out that of more than 10,000 Oregon rural farm homes reporting only 3.5 per cent had coolers. Homemakers repeatedly indicated their need for a cooler and for food storage to supplement their mechanical refrigeration facilities, Mrs. Mack said.

A portable sewing kit, portable wood box, kitchen utility table, folding laundry cart and methods of adjusting the height of all of these—also ranked high in interest. Among farm machinery shown on the tour, the manure loader, posthole digger, buck rake, tilt trailer and timber cattle guard attracted the most requests for information. Those attending a total of more than 15,000 publications, most of which give detailed plans for making the various pieces of farm and home equipment. These publications may be obtained from local county extension offices or the extension service at Corvallis.

The response of those seeing the demonstrations indicates a definite desire on the part of farmers and homemakers to make use of new ideas in saving time and effort, Walker and Mrs. Mack believe.

A-13 gasoline ration coupons became valid today (March 22) and A-14 coupons were invalid after Wednesday.

Each A-13 coupon will be worth four gallons until June 31 leaving present value of "A" coupons unchanged.

Dealers will have through March 31 to turn in A-14 coupons to their suppliers in exchange for gasoline or surrender them at their local boards for ration checks. Distributors will have through April 10 to deposit these coupons in their ration banking accounts. Coupons must be properly indorsed in order to stop illegal trade in coupons.

How to Make Hot Cross Buns

HOT CROSS BUNS

6 to 6½ cups all-purpose flour 1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon 1 egg
½ tsp. nutmeg ¼ cup softened butter or margarine
1 cup milk 1 cup seedless raisins
¾ cup water 1 cup currants
1 cake fresh yeast ½ cup currants

Sift and measure flour and sift again with spices. Heat milk until bubbles form around edge; add water and cool to lukewarm. Add crumbled yeast, sugar and salt, stirring until yeast is dissolved; add beaten egg, then flour mixture all at once. Add butter or margarine, raisins and currants and work until dough leaves side of bowl. Turn out on lightly floured board, knead gently until smooth, about 3 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, cover with damp cloth. Let rise in warm place until double in bulk, about 2 hours. Remove from bowl onto lightly floured board. Shape into ball; place on floured board; divide into four portions; shape each into ball; cover with damp cloth; and let stand 15 minutes. Divide each ball into 8 small ones; place on greased baking sheet 2 inches apart; cover; and let rise until almost double in bulk. Brush with egg wash (1 egg yolk beaten with 3 tablespoons water); cut shallow crosses with scissors on top of each roll. Bake 5 minutes in moderately hot oven (425° F.); reduce to moderate oven (350° F.); and bake 15 to 20 minutes longer, or until done. When almost cold, mark crosses with thin icing made of powdered sugar and just enough cream to spread easily. Makes 32 buns.
