Wayne Shearer Completes 50th Combat Mission

FIFTEENTH AAF IN ITALY—By flying his 50th combat mission in this theater, Captain Wayne G. Shearer, 29 son of Mr. and Mrs. R. N. Shearer, route 1, Cornelius, stepped into the rainbow, marking the end of the exclusive half-a-century club.

Shearer, first pilot and flight leader of a 15th AAF Liberator unit, started his career in 1942 with a mission to the oil refineries at Cichowice oil refineries in Poland. From then on the range of targets widened. The big industrial plants in Austria and Germany and the rail yards in Northern Italy and Yugoslavia.

Leading back to Shearer, "I'd say that the toughest missions were the Vienna and Blechnhammer runs. The refineries have always been our prime target and the Germans gave us the toughest opposition. We never had much trouble from fighters for they do not attack unless they can find a bomber trailing along behind the formation."

Shearer attended Oregon State college until he enlisted in the army in February, 1943. Commissioned in February, 1944, he has been awarded the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters while building up his combat record.

He is a graduate of Hillsboro union high school.

Brown Brothers Meet in Islands

The Philippines seemed a little more like home for Sgt. Russell Brown and Cpl. Clayton Brown of Sherwood when they met for the first time in over two years, according to word received by their parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. N. Brown. Both attended Hillsboro high school and they are serving in the army, although Russell has been overseas two years while his brother left the states 17 months ago.

Sgt. Russell Brown has been presented a commendation for outstanding service and wears the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in the battle at Bataan, March 29, 1944. According to the commendation, Sgt. Brown continued to fire on the enemy after withdrawal had been ordered, successfully covering their retreat. Brown has recently been promoted from private first class to sergeant, according to word received here.

Two other brothers are also in the service, T/c Leonard Brown in Germany and Pvt. Ervin Brown in France.

Jack Mead, SSML3/c, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Mead of Hillsboro, arrived home Friday on a 25-day leave. He is also visiting his sister, Mrs. Donald Kane, of Forest Grove. Young Mead has been in the navy for the last two years, eight months of which were spent in the Philippines in active service.

Zoucha Member Grack Air Unit

AN 8th AIR FORCE FIGHTER STATION, England—Among those deserving the second anniversary in the European theater of operations of the famous 56th fighter group, highest-scoring fighter outfit in 8th air force, was Pfc. Walter Zoucha of Hillsboro.

Pfc. Zoucha, recently promoted to his present grade, is a member of the ordnance company which services this crack P-47 Thunderbolt fighter outfit. He is an aircraft armorer in his organization. His group has destroyed 329 German planes—666 in the air and 103 on the ground—the first fighter group in the 8th air force to reach the 300 figure. The 100 which he has been doing has contributed much toward making the aerial missions over Germany a success.

Pfc. Zoucha entered the armed forces January 7, 1943, and has been stationed overseas for almost two years. In civilian life he was employed by the Hurley Marine Works, Oakland, Cal., doing ship repair work. His mother, Mrs. Catherine Zoucha, lives at 313 West Oak street, Hillsboro.

Wounded Soldier Receives Discharge

Pfc. Harvey F. Brosher, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Brosher, route 2, Hillsboro, has received an honorable discharge from the service. He was wounded in the invasion of Kwajalein atoll in the Marshalls, received shrapnel wounds in the right arm and leg and a skull fracture.

He was awarded the Purple Heart and has two combat stars on his service ribbon.

Cpl. Stephens Home

Cpl. Irving L. Stephens, who was seriously wounded in action in France last August and is now under observation and treatment at Barnes General hospital, is spending a 30-day furlough at the home of his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. O. M. Heaton of south of Hillsboro.

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Orenco Parents Hear About Son

Major Robert Foster Haggerty, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Haggerty of Orenco, was transferred to a Japanese prisoner-of-war camp in Japan last fall, according to word received last week through their daughter-in-law in San Francisco. The information was brought back by one of the American prisoners freed from Cabanatuan prison in the Philippines.

Major Haggerty, who served as American provost marshal at Cabanatuan, was well and had not lost much weight at the time of being transferred, it was revealed. The parents received a card from him in May, 1944, saying that he was well.
