School Cafeteria Proves Success

REEDVILLE—Our school cafeteria, sponsored by P.T.A. which opened in January as an experiment, has proved entirely successful, reports Mrs. Charles Stubbs, P.T.A. president. The children are served in relays to prevent delay. An average of 100 daily are served. The primary grades at 11:30 and the upper grades at noon. Each group has separate tables with their respective teachers in charge. The teachers collect from their own groups and Mr. Jones, principal, records total receipts. Mrs. Stubbs has charge of all expenditures which include the purchase of commodities and the salary of Mrs. Dan Hill, the cook, also new kitchen equipment which totals \$60, with all bills paid to date. The cooperation of the mothers is greatly appreciated, as two of them are voluntary assistants on different days. Names of these are posted in advance in the P.T.A. room by Mrs. Stubbs. Four different children of the upper grades volunteer each week for the dishwashing and thereby earn their lunch. A new stove for the kitchen is imperative and will be purchased when funds are available.

income of \$1,000,000 in a similar period, he said. The funds, he said, would have had to come right out of the general fund.

Other bills touched on were the so-called scrip bill, which would have liberalized the service of drinks in bars of non-profit organizations; right of appeal for liquor retailers, which he said would have had a negative effect on control, and the Burke wine bill, which would have prohibited sale of all wines fortified by brandy except in state stores and was an effort to give one type of wine the "bulge" over natural wines.

Representatives Praised
Work of the two county representatives, H. T. Hesse and J. O. Johnson, was praised by Patterson, who said both of them did a great job in the house. Representative Hesse, he said, is a very effective man in the house, served as vice-chairman of the powerful ways and means committee and saw to it that the state gets a dollar's worth for every dollar spent. Representative Johnson did a particularly good job on alcohol control bills, he said.

Referring to lobbyists, Senator Patterson declared that he met none in Salem who had a dishonest purpose in mind. Some of the lobbyists, it was pointed out, are specialists in their lines and are a valuable adjunct of the legislature in analyzing measures. A lobbyist that is dishonest does not last very long, according to the senator.

The senator said that he was grateful to the people of Washington county for giving him the opportunity of serving in the legislature and that he hoped to be worthy of the trust imposed in him. He also pointed out that the counsel of many fine men in the legislature was helpful to him.

Chamber members were urged by Jake Weil to take advantage of the free chest X-rays to be provided here through a mobile unit sponsored by the Washington County Public Health association.

Co-operation in the United National clothing collection was called for by P. A. Anderson, who stressed the need for serviceable clothing for people in countries that have been occupied by the enemy powers.
