

Allies Continue Gains on Western Front; 41st Makes a New Invasion

Gen. Patton's U. S. 3d army battling down last 58 miles toward Czechoslovak frontier, lunges head-on at Gotha Wednesday and reaches Arnstadt, according to German accounts.

British forces drive to within 48 miles of the North sea in dash to trap Germans in Western Holland. U. S. 8th army reaches West river, 183 miles from Berlin.

Strong force of heavy American bombers strike submarine yards at Kiel and Hamburg and a number of airfields over wide area in Northern Germany.

41st Strokes Again

Forty-first division veterans invaded Tawi Tawi at south end of Sulu archipelago within 30 miles of oil-rich Borneo Monday in a 200-mile leap southwestward from Mindanao. They also took two small islands at the southwest end of Tawi Tawi, Sanga and Bongao, along with two airfields within easy striking range of Borneo.

Okinawa Gains Swift

Ten American drives moved swiftly southward toward Naha, capital of Okinawa, and possibly first major resistance by the Japanese since the Yanks landed. The Americans have overrun some 40 square miles of the important island.

In Vienna Outskirts

Russians smashed into outskirts of Vienna Wednesday and word reached Stockholm that civil war had broken out in the Austrian capital.

Manpower Bill Crushed

Senate overrules President Roosevelt in crushing 49 to 29 rejection of bill empowering administration to freeze workers to war jobs and apply other sweeping manpower controls.

Solon Sees Peace for Fish Groups

Hopes for a satisfactory solution to the long-time battle between commercial fishermen and sportsmen appear bright as a result of legislation passed at Salem during the last session, according to the declaration of State Senator P. L. Patterson in speaking Wednesday at the local Lions club.

Compromise bills eliminate part of the grievances and make it mandatory for fish and game commissions to get together and recommend a program acceptable to both sports and commercial fishermen at the next session.

Legislation passed provides for the elimination of set nets, shortens the season in most streams and fishing, controls the size of net mesh and declares steelhead to be a game fish and salmon a food fish. Patterson explained that the bill would also strip the constitution of the state and steps must be taken to effect the change.

The senator scored the federal public health department in discussing the battle over pasteurization legislation. He charged the bureau with seeking to undermine the people's confidence in the state department by releasing through the press information regarding the pasteurization of milk without notifying or submitting the data to the state.

He declared that the federal unit sought legislation to force the pasteurization of milk over to the government as a means of further engulfing our economy into a planned program. He pointed out that the law did not require pasteurization of all milk but strengthened the Bangs disease tests, he said. Herds with a clean record are required to have their milk pasteurized. Fear of unfavourable tests are required before pasteurization is mandatory. Raw milk may be sold again through herds that have had two clean tests 30 days apart and a third clean test at six months.

Patterson urged a favorable vote on school legislation and the five mill property tax measure to be submitted to the people in June. He pointed out that any bill assigning part of the income tax revenue to schools would be unconstitutional since it would not be a direct offset to real property taxes.

The cigarette tax proposal would raise an additional \$2,000,000 for schools, bringing the total to \$10,000,000, he said. He said he would support the measure if it was "unholy," declaring it a convenient argument to defeat a sales tax on a non-essential, 90-cent-a-pack cigarette. Proceeds from the five mill property tax would raise \$10,000,000 in two years for repairing, equipping and construction of buildings for schools, higher education, and state institutions. If passed, surplus income tax revenues could be used as this would constitute a new source of income. This would permit taking advantage of the large wartime incomes which might otherwise be lost to the state.

Point Values on Pork, Fais Up

The GFA has ordered a boost in ration point values for pork and pork products. Increases were also ordered for lard, shortening, margarine, salad and cooking oils.

Point values for all cuts of beef, lamb, veal and butter remain unchanged and point values for most cheeses also remain the same.

Increases for most pork cuts and work products are one to two points a pound. Sausages are advanced a point a pound, and there are increases of one to two points for most sausage products, meat in tin or glass containers and for many ready-to-eat meats.

Lard, shortening, salad and cooking oils go up from four to six points a pound and margarine from five to eight points.

Recommend Spray For Prune Thrip

Prune thrips are now emerging in numbers and already in some orchards, where the bud development is advanced to the green tip stage, are beginning to cause injury, reports Palmer S. Torvend, county agent, according to information received from S. C. Jones, associate entomologist at Oregon State college.

In orchards where this has occurred, a spray to be applied immediately is recommended for their control. Infestations will vary in individual orchards and growers who contemplate spraying should make an examination of about 300 buds, picked at random throughout the orchard. In counts made from these buds for the number of thrips present, where 90 or more are found per 100 buds, enough are present to cause serious damage and a spray should be applied immediately. Torvend said.

The best spray to use is composed of nicotine sulphate 40 per cent one pint, liquid lime sulphur three gallons, and water to make 100 gallons of spray. This is a contact spray and should be applied thoroughly to all parts of the trees and must hit the insect in order to kill it. A direct coarse spray with at least 350 pounds pressure is effective.

M. Eunice Harris, 90, a native daughter of Washington county died March 22 at the home of her daughter in Spokane, Wash., and funeral services were held at Che-

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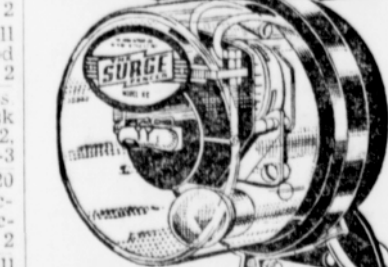
