

Governor Snell Urges Observance of Army Day; Payrolls Hit High Mark

SALISBURY—Governor Earl Snell has issued a proclamation asking that Friday, April 6th, be observed as army day. The proclamation said: "Let us fly the flag at our homes and places of business. Let us sponsor proper observances in our places of public meeting and in our schools. And, unitedly may we rededicate ourselves to the quickening of all our war efforts and to the organization of all our efforts toward a lasting peace."

Oregon Payrolls
Reported wages for the year 1944 may total \$200,000,000 in Oregon, more than three times the pre-war average of \$240,000,000. Benefits paid in the first 11 weeks of this year were up slightly from the same period a year ago, with \$55,965 compared to \$50,600 for the early part of 1943. More than half of the claimants were women.

Timber Fire Warning
Extreme caution against fire in northwest timbered areas is urged by State Forester Rogers who warns that the stage is all set for a repetition of the disastrous spring fire of 1943. All fire wardens and fire guards, particularly in western Oregon, are on the alert. Two years ago more than 25,000 acres of the finest young timber in our state were destroyed when fern fires spread out of control. Three or four days of dry weather create an ideal fire situation.

Action on Bills

pleted action on 450-odd bills passed by the legislature, finishing his job well ahead of the April 10th deadline fixed by the constitution. He vetoed five bills, signing the rest.
