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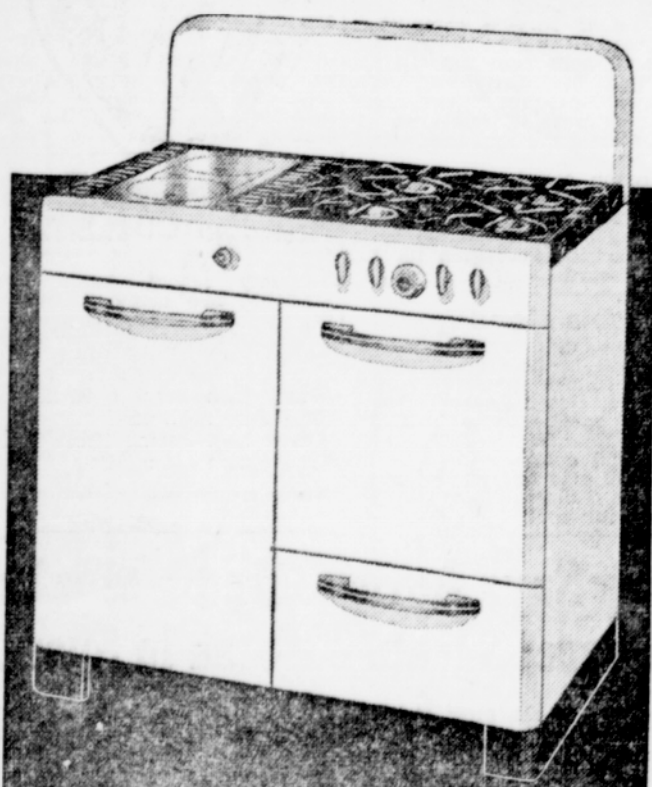

Hillsboro's Spartan diamond squad will open the 1945 Tualatin-Yamhill valley baseball league schedule Friday afternoon against the Vikings at Forest Grove.

Although weather conditions have made it impossible to hold regular practice sessions, Coach "Omy" Omsundson reports that his squad has real promise of developing into a strong club.

One of an experienced pitcher presents the biggest problem to the Hillsboro team, Jack Siegrist. Bob Morrison and Gilbert Howell, all left-handed, are the best prospects. Other promising chuckers are Bob Edwards and Roy Matz.

To date Omsundson has been alternating Siegrist, Morrison and Howell on the mound and when not pitching, has them working out in their regular positions.

Tentative lineup for other positions are: Letterman, Farley Rice, catcher; Bob Holmquist, first base; Forrest Henning, second base; Bob MacKenzie, third base; Morrison and Howell, shortstop; Siegrist and Howell, left field; Stan Neitling, center field; Letterman and Danny Sella, right field. Angling Season Opens Saturday

The general angling season for trout over six inches in length will open Saturday, April 14, in all counties of the state except Lake county, where the opening date is set for May 20.

The bag limit is the same as last year, 15 fish but not more than 15 pounds and one fish in any one day, and 30 fish but not more than 30 pounds and two fish in any seven consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

Waters that are closed to angling entirely or that have special seasons are listed in the official angling synopsis of the game commission, which is just coming off the press and will be distributed as soon as possible to license agents throughout the state.

The angling license fee is \$3 for residents and \$5 for nonresidents. There is also a \$3 10-day license for nonresidents. Anyone who has not been in the state for a period of six months immediately prior to applying for a license is classified as a nonresident. All service-men, however, are entitled to purchase licensed at resident fees regardless of their status as residents.

W. R. McNeal Funeral Today

Funeral services for William Raymond (Ray) McNeal of Cornelius, who died Monday in a local hospital after a brief illness, will be conducted at 2 p. m. today (Thursday) at Young's Funeral Home here. Committal will be at Fir Laurel cemetery.

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Son of Pioneers Traffic Victim

Isaac Ennes, 80, route 2, Hoquiam, Wash., son of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. K. Ennes, Hillsboro pioneer, was drowned March 27 after his pickup truck overturned into a ditch with two feet of water near Hoquiam city limits.

His wife, Nora, 74, a passenger in the machine, is reported recovering in Aberdeen General hospital from bruises and shock. Mrs. Ennes escaped from the overturned machine by crawling out the door after she had vainly attempted to extricate her husband.

Mr. Ennes was dead when taken from the truck by a nearby resident shortly after the accident. The machine evidently slid in the loose gravel at a sharp bend in the road and overturned after it rolled down a four-foot embankment.

Mr. Ennes married Miss Nora McFee, a niece of Charles W. McFee of Hillsboro, November 15, 1888. They had lived in the Hoquiam area for 17 years.

Besides his wife, he is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Kennedy, Seattle, and Mrs. Wilma Vey, Issaquah; two sons, Allan, Tacoma, and Robert, Aloha; a brother, Sam, Portland, and two sisters, Mrs. Martha Landes, Toledo, Ore., and Mrs. Nancy Johnson, Hillsboro.
