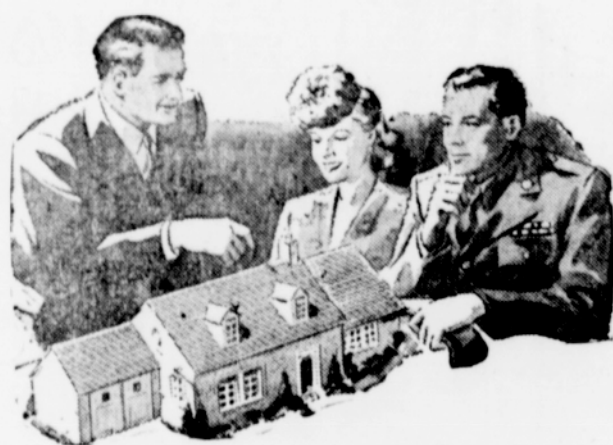
A nice musical program was presented by the children. It was planned and produced by them without aid from adults.
