Member of Famed Unit
Col. Robert Van Domelen, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Van Domelen, is a member of 732nd tank battalion which is credited with killing 1400 Germans, capturing 484 others, knocking out 11 tanks and disabling three others and destroying 21 pillboxes, 41 vehicles and 64 guns. Van Domelen, a tank gunner, has been in the line with the 8th army about 300 days since it was indoctrinated in battle near Fondi, Italy, last spring. In one of its first actions the 732nd sealed off a German pocket in which 600 Germans were taken prisoner.

Paying or Accepting Higher Than Applicable Ceiling Prices is a Direct Violation of M. P. R. 540

WHAT THIS MEANS TO YOU

1. There are two ceiling prices "As Is" and "Warranty."
2. An individual may sell his car to another individual or to a dealer at the "As Is" ceiling price.
3. A dealer may sell used cars at "Warranty" ceiling prices or less.
4. When an individual sells his car to another individual, the buyer and seller must fill out.

sign and file with O. P. A. a certificate of transfer certifying the price at which the car was sold. This is also required when a dealer sells to an individual buyer.

5. When a dealer sells a used car at the "Warranty" ceiling price, he must give the buyer a written warranty (prepared by O. P. A.) that the car is in good condition and will remain so for 30 days or 1,000 miles, whichever occurs first.

CONSULT AN ESTABLISHED DEALER

All persons offering to buy or sell Used Cars are not necessarily dealers. M. P. R. No. 540 clearly defines the term "Dealer." Under certain circumstances, especially related to their ability to render repair service, some "Dealers" are prohibited from selling Used Cars at "Warranty" prices.

When buying a Used Car be sure the seller has facilities for reconditioning and servicing it.

CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER

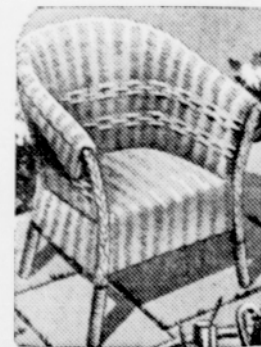
