Wood Waste Tar New Fuel Source

The possibility of using wood waste in the production of high grade anti-knock motor fuel is pointed out by three staff members of the Oregon forest products laboratory at Oregon State college, in a recent technical report published in the March issue of "Timberman," Portland magazine.

One of the most promising methods of utilizing sawmill waste is in making charcoal, a by-product of which is wood tar, which though somewhat similar to coal tar, has been studied but little. The three authors of the report, Paul G. Schrader, Bert E. Christensen, and Leo Friedman, have undertaken an extensive study of this tar which, if successful, may lead to industrial processes for utilization of wood waste which will make it the most important product of wood distillation.

They cite some work of English chemists who found that cracking Douglas fir tar produced a high grade anti-knock motor fuel. The yield reported by these chemists, if applied to the waste from the annual cut of Douglas fir in the northwest, would produce 25 million gallons of motor fuel with anti-knock qualities equal to those of benzene.

Early Purchase of Coal Advised

Whether the people of the Pacific Northwest can avoid a cut in their coal deliveries next winter, in view of the wartime fuel shortage, will depend upon the amount of coal they store in their basins this spring and summer, while fuel can be supplied, according to the northwest solid fuels rationing branch of the OPA.

Instead of waiting for preferred kinds or sizes of coal, consumers should protect themselves by accepting whatever usable coal they can get. Failure of people to store coal early may impair production to the point where deliveries will have to be cut next winter, because dealers are not equipped to store large quantities of coal, and mines close down unless coal is ordered and dealers have sufficient storage space to permit deliveries.

With sufficient tonnage ordered to keep them in full operation during the warm months, it is believed that the mines can produce enough to meet the fuel coal needs. This statement was issued following a conference in Washington, D. C., between James J. Miksak, chief of the northwest solid fuels rationing branch of OPA, and Deputy Administrator C. U. Potter. Potter added that sufficient locally produced coals should be stored to keep the local mines in full operation.

Traffic Toll for Month Announced

Traffic accidents claimed a toll of 23 lives during the month of March, according to figures announced by Robert S. Farley, secretary of state. Of the total, eight or 36 per cent were pedestrians. In addition to the eight pedestrian fatalities, there were eight fatal accidents involving collisions between two cars, three involving non-collision accidents, and one vehicle-train accident.

Thirty-two per cent of the fatalities resulted from accidents occurring in rural areas. The urban toll was unusually heavy in March, Farrell said, with fatalities reported in Portland, Baker, Astoria, Eugene, Salem, McMinnville and Hillsboro.

Unsafe walking practices on the part of pedestrians, speed at intersections, intoxication and failure to observe stop signs were the principal factors noted in fatal accidents in Oregon in March.
