

## Coffee Club Buys \$100 Bond; Has Mothers' Program

Purchase of another \$100 bond was voted by the Coffee club at its meeting Friday afternoon at the chamber of commerce. This brings the club's total to \$1100.

The Mothers' Day program was opened by an address by Rev. Edmund T. Murnane of Portland, state chaplain of the Catholic Daughters of America. Excerpts from his speech follow: "There is a tendency to lose sight of the dignity of home-making and motherhood," said the speaker. "It may be men who have the world, but women have inspired the men to great things. The world of tomorrow will be what women make it. The inspirations are carried on by mothers. United Nations conference at San Francisco will be no more successful than the people who comprise the various nations. Peace truly never comes from meetings or peace treaties, only when the respect for the moral law. If our world is to look forward to lasting peace, mothers must teach their families to be respectful and honest. The family is a unit of society. If pledges made at marriage are not held sacred, what hope is there for other pledges or promises. Mothers are the character, and work of dignity should be first and principal teaching of children. Nations depend on mothers as makers of men who will make the world a better place to live in, and have respect for law. The mother is very dark unless we can build a race of men who are taught justice and charity. We as individuals should realize that mothers are building a world."

1 lb. pork sausage or ground meat  
1 cup thinly sliced onion

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender, about 20 minutes; drain. Brown sausage or meat balls in frying pan. In a well-greased casserole, arrange the meat balls; cover with a layer of onions; add macaroni. Add seasonings to taste; pour over macaroni mixture. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes or until thoroughly heated and cheese melted. Serves 6.
