Large shipment arrived this week. Motor Corps, Mrs. R. W. Well, chairman — Nine trips with polo cases, 3175 hours, 495 miles; trip to Doerbecher, three hours, 40 miles; two girls set up blood bank, two hours; one girl worked at blood bank five hours; total, 417 hours and 508 miles. Blood Plasma, Mrs. F. Abendroth, chairman — More than 290 bottles mailed for blood plasma days; 247 were listed for registration, 222 were registered and 290 pints of blood given; two registered donors turned away because all bottles were filled; 226 volunteer hours rendered exclusive of motor corps and canteen. Mrs. Elsie Pifer gave over her appointment to a donor from Laurewood, thus saving tires and gasoline for a long trip.
