

192 Pints Blood Donated Friday At Local Center

Total of 192 pints of blood were donated at the county center here last Friday morning during the monthly visit of the Red Cross mobile unit. This was eight pints below the goal set by the donor service committee for the day.

Understanding Peace Essential

Intelligent understanding of the problems of the little people of the world is necessary to preservation of the peace asserted Charles M. Barbe of KGW in Portland in speaking before the Rotary club here Thursday. Peace, whether it exists or not depends on the state of mind of the individual, he said.

Whether we like it or not, he said, Europe will be the testing ground for peace.

Intolerance comes out of ignorance, according to Barbe, who held that some people were playing Hitler's tricks in racial intolerance. As an example he cited the organization of anti-Japanese-American groups in this country.

The world today, Barbe said, is as small as our backyard, pointing out that Moscow was only eight hours away by plane. Discussing our attitude of non-interference with the governments of other people while standing by and letting other governments interfere, the speaker held that it was essential to our peace to have governments friendly to us.
