Hilhi Asks Special Tax for Expansion

That 243 eighth graders will be eligible to attend Hilhi next fall. This group added to the sophomore class numbering 265 will give one of the largest lower divisions in history. If the 16-year age limit passed by the legislature is enforced, an additional 65 students will be added. Principal John R. Cox stated. Salary increases were also provided for the principal and clerk.

Another major item in the budget is \$3000 for remodeling the school cafeteria. Present facilities are inadequate and the kitchen must be remodeled to meet requirements. It is also necessary to equip an additional biology laboratory at an additional cost of \$400.

Breakdown of the estimated expenditures for the coming year with comparative figures for 1944-45 in parentheses are: general control \$3000 (\$7320), instruction \$2640 (\$3900), operation of plant \$9600 (\$9700), maintenance and repairs \$4000 (\$4000), auxiliary agencies \$17,800 (\$18,600), fixed charges \$2200 (\$1700), capital outlays \$8,650 (\$1500), debt service \$500 (\$200), emergency \$3000 (\$3000).

The budget and proposed property purchase and special levy were approved by the citizens' committee consisting of Arthur Reising, F. L. Brown, Edgar Reiser, Kenneth Donaldson and Herman Schmidt. This group met with the district board consisting of M. P. Gady, John Gates, John Kamma, W. H. McNay, Carl Bechen.

Kamma is the retiring board member.

are expected to be paid in the tax to about 15 mills in the district. If the cigarette-tax bill is passed in June, an additional \$6000 would be available to the district and could bring the millage down to about 13, Poynter stated. Millage last year was 17.2.

The budget as prepared for the coming year, includes salary increases of \$200 a year for the superintendent, principals and all teachers. Continuing on the staff for another year. Three textbook changes required by state law brought an additional cost of \$800. The carrying-over of the fuel supply, maintenance and repairs dropped from \$900 last year when three school rooms had to be altered to a normal of \$450 for the coming year.

Capital outlay schedule is materially reduced since the budget last year carried an item of \$3500 for a new bus and an additional \$1400 for building alterations and new furniture.

Superintendent Poynter explained that since the budget was actually prepared in March, bonded indebtedness of the district is listed at \$18,000. Actually \$9000 of this was paid since the estimates were drawn and the bonded debt of the district is only \$9000 at present.

Fruit-Vegetable Prices Established

To Members of Oregon Nut Growers, Inc.:

Under date of May 25th the Management and Board of Oregon Nut Growers, Inc., called a special membership meeting for 1:30 p. m., Tuesday, June 5, 1945, for the purpose of voting on proposed merger and consolidation with two other nut co-operatives and to vote on consolidation for other activities.

There was attached a statement to members by Board of Directors and Manager in which they belittle the members who insisted on the total membership having a voice in decisions on this important problem. They have given no reason why a merger with these other successful co-operatives should not occur, and yet they ask the membership to vote "no" on proposed merger and consolidation based, as they say, "on information which they have gathered," and yet they appear reluctant to give this information to the membership. They also recommended that membership vote "yes" by mail on proposal that a committee of Board and members be appointed to investigate feasibility of this Association engaging in other activities, and to plan and act if found desirable. In other words, they tell you to vote "no" on a proposition which has had three years study and then they ask you to vote "yes" on some future program which they might decide to enter into.

We think it would be poor business for the membership to make a decisive vote on these two proposals without knowledge of what it is all about, and in order that you may have a better understanding of both sides of the problem we would recommend that you attend the meeting and vote on the two proposals after you have heard both sides of the problem discussed.
