

Auto Use Stamp Now Available At Post Offices

New \$3 auto use tax stamps for the year beginning July 1, 1945, went on sale in all post offices in Oregon last Saturday. The law requires the owner of every automobile, truck, motorcycle, or bus which is used on the public highway on or after July 1, 1945, to buy this stamp and display it on his vehicle. The stamps are transferable with change of ownership of the vehicle.

A campaign will start shortly after July 1 to check on all persons who had failed to purchase their auto tax stamp. All persons who are found driving motor vehicles without the stamps properly displayed will be liable to a penalty of \$5 or more in addition to the cost of the stamp. Owners of motor vehicles are advised not to be misled by false rumors alleging that this tax has been repealed. Post offices will sell the stamps over the counter for cash only, and will conduct no mail order business. Auto tax stamps may be ordered by mail from the Collector of Internal Revenue, Portland. Payment on mail orders must be by post office money order, certified check, or certified check. An un-certified check cannot be accepted in payment for these stamps. In Oregon all auto tax stamps are required to be placed in the left-hand corner of the inside of the windshield.

Used Car Ad Copy Regulated by OPA

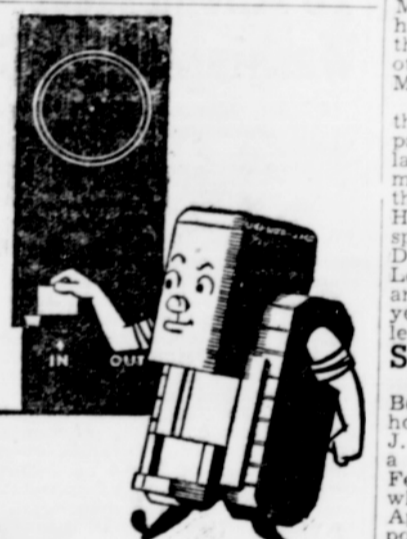

The new ruling requires that all advertisements offering used cars for sale must include a description of the car, the selling price, and a statement containing the words "OPA ceiling" or other words expressing the same meaning. Advertisements which do not carry these statements will be considered unlawful and the advertiser will be held responsible.

efficient, he said. Enrollment at state schools has increased 50 per cent.
Don't Break Faith
A survey has shown that 10 per cent of 13,000 of the 130,000 Oregon boys and girls in the service went back to school and take advantage of the educational opportunities provided through the GI bill of rights and the state, where state schools of higher education were overcrowded with an enrollment of 7,000. If we fail to provide the educational facilities, we will break faith with our veterans, according to Patterson, who pointed out that in that event they may go elsewhere to school and we will lose our best crop of young men and women.

Building needs for state institutions and state schools of higher education have been pared to absolute necessities, the senator said. The state higher education board set its "must" budget at \$12,000,000, but this was cut down to \$10,000,000. The "must" budget of \$1,000,000 was budgeted by the legislature, \$2,500,000 is to be paid in through student fees and \$4,500,000 is to be paid from the building fund. The committee shaved the "must" budget for state institutions from \$15,000,000 to \$8,000,000, while the "must" budget in the present state budget and the remaining \$6,000,000 to come from the building fund if approved.

Senator Patterson said the constitution provides that taxes cannot be increased more than six per cent over the highest levy of any of the last three years without a vote of the people. When the people approved the state income tax, it was provided that it should be used only for property tax offset. The legislature levied a five mill property tax for two years to raise \$10,000,000 for the state building fund, but provided at the same time that it would be paid out of surplus income taxes. Because this sum is in excess of the six per cent limitation, it must go to a vote of the people, Patterson said.

The special vote is being taken now because if delayed until the election of November, 1946, the surplus might have melted away, asserted Patterson, who pointed to the fact that many war industry workers are still leaving the state. He said that 60 per cent of state unemployment benefits paid out in March went outside of Oregon.

"The money is paid in today and it won't cost you a dime more," declared the senator.

Patterson paid tribute to the work of Representative H. T. Hesse of Scholls in the house of representatives and said that Mr. Hesse's judgment was valued highly.

camp in freezing cold weather. There was almost no heat for the entire time. He had no extra clothing. Blankets were synthetic, being made of wood. Food was scarce most of the time.

One of the highlights of Capt. McLeod's homecoming was seeing his two-year-old son, Sherman, for the first time. His wife, Mrs. Dorothy McLeod, and his mother, Mrs. Mabel McLeod, live in Hillsboro. The local officer is a veteran of the four major European campaigns, has a bronze star for gallantry in action, the Purple Heart medal with oak leaf cluster and the combat infantryman's badge. He enlisted three years ago and spent 10 months in England before D-day. He went through Fort Lewis, Wash., on his return home and noted that it was exactly three years and three days since he had left the camp after his enlistment.

Sgt. Loomer Home
S/Sgt. Charles R. Loomer, near Beaverton airman, arrived at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Loomer Monday after being a prisoner of the Germans since February 22. He was at Mooksbury when liberated by the 3rd army on April 29. He was down to 107 pounds when freed.

Sgt. Loomer holds the air medal with four oak leaf clusters and the Purple Heart. His wife, Mrs. Viola Loomer of Loraine, Texas, joined him at his parents' home at Tobias, He formerly lived in Hillsboro.

S/Sgt. Charles M. Roberts, husband of Mrs. Eda M. Roberts of Buxton, has been liberated from a German prison camp.
Liberated Prisoner
S/Sgt. Willie A. Meinecke, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert M. Meinecke of Sherwood, has been liberated from a prisoner of war camp in Germany. He was first reported as killed in action in Italy June 22, 1944, and then later listed as a prisoner of war.

Use of Canned Milk Restricted

That supplies of canned milk continue available for infants, invalids, and other consumers to whom it is an essential food, the OPA has cut off further supplies from establishments that use canned milk in large quantities. Action provides that institutional and industrial users—including restaurants, in-plant feeding establishments, prisons, and manufacturers of other products—will not be permitted to use their red points for canned milk in areas where fluid milk or other adequate substitutes are not available, however, application may be made to OPA and permission to use red points to buy canned milk may be given if need is shown.

Luggers and users on ships, boats, tugs and barges, as well as feeding establishments that qualify because of isolated location, are not restricted and may continue to buy canned milk. Small boarding houses, hospitals and child feeding establishments also are not restricted, OPA said.

During the first quarter of 1945, the use of canned milk by civilians exceeded the allocated supply by 2,483,000 cases, OPA explained. In order that military needs may be met, this excessive use must be made up out of the civilian supply.

Add melted butter or margarine and fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Drop by tablespoons on moderately hot, lightly-greased griddle or heavy frying pan. Turn cakes when bubbles form on top surface. Bake until golden brown. Serve with equal amounts of melted butter or margarine and heated syrup. Makes 10 to 12 medium-size cakes.

DUMPLING QUICKIE
2 cups biscuit mix 1 cup milk
Place mix in bowl; add milk all at once; stir only until all of the flour is dampened. Drop dumplings by tablespoons on gently boiling stew or liquid in large kettle with tight-fitting cover; cover; steam 15 minutes or until done, without removing cover. Makes 12 medium-size dumplings.

Time Extended on Drivers' Licenses

Oregon driver's licenses, issued on or after June 15, 1941, need not be renewed this year. Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell said today. The 1945 legislature assembly extended the time of these licenses to June 30, 1947.

The numbers of all licenses thus extended bear the prefix "M," Farrell said.

"Many drivers apparently believe they are required to renew their driver's licenses this year, but the act of the 1945 legislature extends the time these licenses are valid through the next two years," Farrell said.

The secretary of state explained it is not necessary that a new license card be obtained, showing the next expiration date. All enforcement authorities throughout the nation have been notified of the legislature's action in extending the time the present licenses are valid.

However, if the license card has become mutilated, or the driver wishes a new card showing a change of address or personal description, he may make application to the secretary of state for a duplicate card which will be issued for a fee of 25 cents. Farrell emphasized, however, that drivers are not required by law to obtain a new card to show a change of address, or to show personal description, or to show the new expiration date.
